ALLEGED VIOLATOR
OF MANN ACT HELD
HERE WITHOUT BAIL

Charged With Taking 13-Year-
Old Girl to Michigan on
Marriage Pretext.

An investigation by officials of
the juvenile court into statements
alleged to have been made by a 13
year old school girl led to the ar-
rest of William Sparr, 30 years old,
at the residence of his foster moth-
er on Somerset Blvd., by Mishawaka
authorities, Friday afternoon, on the
charge of violating the Mann White
Slave act. Sparr is being held in the
local police station without bonds
and the girl was taken to the county
jail at the request of County Pro-
tective Officer Mrs. Grimes, pending
further investigation.

According to verbal confessions,
made to have been obtained from
both Sparr and the girl by local po-
lice officers, the child's mother ac-
companied the couple to South Bend
last week where they attempted to ob-
tain a marriage license but were re-
fused notwithstanding the fact that
the mother consented to the mar-
riage. Finding their efforts there
frustrated, the couple went to Elk-
hart last Friday and again met re-
fusal. The pair then decided to try
Michigan, and proceeded to Stur-
gis, the girl's former home, where
they are said to have remained over
Saturday and Sunday, spending the
nights at the home of the girl's sis-
ter, and returning to Mishawaka
without trying to get married.

The stories told by both the girl
and Sparr to the police coincided,
and it is alleged they both confess-
ed, that after spending Sunday night
together, they returned to Mishawa-
ka and told their parents and friends
they were married at Centerville,
the county seat of St. Joseph coun-
ty, Michigan last Saturday but that
they were not going to live together
as man and wife until arrangements
for a license and furnishings could
be completed.

Upon their return to Mishawaka,
the girl is said to have gone to the
home of an aunt who lives in Floral
Park, while Sparr returned to his

residence on Somerset Blvd., where he
was later arrested by officers from
the local police department at the
request of the South Bend juvenile
court.

Sparr Has Police Record Here.
According to Chief of Police Harry
Barrows, William Sparr has been in
trouble here a number of times,
the last time being in connection
with the alleged theft of electric and
plumbing fixtures from a number of
newly erected houses, last spring. He
is said to have been implicated with
Sam Hammond in the same deal.
The latter's bond was declared for-
feited in a South Bend court, Friday
morning when he failed to make his
appearance to face the charges which
resulted from the alleged theft of
the house fixtures, on the same
charges are still being held against
Sparr, who will be tried later in a
higher court.
