NOTICE is hereby given that the Executive committee of the State Board of Agriculture will meet in the Supreme Court Room at Indianapolis on Thursday, the 5th day of May, 1853, at one o'clock P. M., for the purpose of arranging schedules of premiums, and appointing the time and place of holding the next annual Fair.

Counties desiring of holding the exhibition, will then have an opportunity of making proposals

The place at which the exhibition is proposed to be held, will be expected to furnish the Executive Committee the amount in cash that will be paid by the 20th of September, or at their option, the furnishing grounds enclosed with a suitable board fence, including a grove if practicable, and embracing an area of at least twenty acres, all the necessary halls, and structures for the exhibition of manufactured articles and the products of the earth, a speaker's stand and seats in front for the accommodation of 2000 persons, a mechanics' hall 200 feet long by 20 in width, a manufacturers' hall of the size, well covered pens and other structures for cattle, sheep, swine, and fowls, 200 good substantial stalls for horses within the enclosure, ample forage of good quality on the grounds for horses, cattle, and sheep, and an ample supply on the grounds, of water for man and beast, business offices for the secretary and treasurer, to be built under the direction of the Superintendent appointed by the executive committee, and the ground to be in full preparation for the Fair by the 20th of September, or the cash paid by that time. The proposals in each case are to be accompanied by the names of responsible persons known to the executive committee.
