inct, and positive acceptance or refusal of my proposal, without any evasion of the point, or creation of new issues. I will make no other issue, and enter into no discussion with you until this is disposed of, and your reply, if not published by yourself, will be published by me."

Mr. Maupenny's reply is a most triumphant one, showing conclusively, that the contracts in question were contrary to law and the regulations of the Indian department. He puts Gov. Reeder utterly hors de combat, and closes his communication as follows:

"In relation to the singular proposition for 'a compact' between us, by which it shall be agreed that, in a given contingency to transpire by the first of October next, the President shall remove one of us, I have to remark that I have no bargain to make, and certainly none of this character. The power of removal as well as appointment is vested in the President, and it seems to me it is neither consistent nor respectful to the President to entertain your proposition. Were I to do so, however, with a profert of the communication to which I am now replying, and the other testimony in the Indian office, I might safely rest the case."

"As I am not in the habit of publishing in the newspapers of the day the official correspondence of this office, I must leave to you the pleasure of giving this communication to the public. The next chapter in this "strange, eventful history" is the subjoined report from the Secretary of State to Gov. Reeder:

"DEPARTMENT OF STATE } Washington, June 11, 1855. Sir: I am directed by the President to inform you that with the developments before him in reference to the purchase of Kansas half-breed reservations made by you in the territory of Kansas, and in which, as you state, Judges Johnston and Elmore, of the Supreme court of the Territory, and Mr. Isaacs, the district attorney, participated, and in reference also to other speculations by you in land of the Territory, apparently in violation of the acts of Congress and of regulations of the department, he feels embarrassed to see how, consistently with his convictions of duty, he can allow the present official relation to the territory of yourself or of either of the other gentlemen named to continue, unless the impressions which now rest upon his mind be removed by satisfactory explanations.

"The President will, however, be glad to receive and consider any explanation which you may desire to make in regard to the character and extent of the transactions above referred to, and particularly the matters spoken of in the letter of G. W. Clarke, Indian Agent, dated May 8, 1855, and addressed to the Superintendent of Indian Affairs for Kansas, a copy of which was forwarded to you at Easton on the 5th inst. "I am, sir, very respectfully Your obedient servant, W. L. MAYER. Hon. A. H. REEDER."

To this Gov. Reeder replied as follows: "New York, June 13. Sir: Your letter of the 11th, postmarked the 13th, was handed to me between ten and eleven o'clock last night, after I had made all my arrangements to leave for Kansas at six o'clock this morning. "I could not remain at home to reply fully to the communication without gross neglect of my official duties, and it is equally clear that I cannot give to the grave matter it contains the deliberate reply which they require while I am en route day and night. Nothing is left me, therefore but to proceed to the Territory, and reply to your communication there. I wrote to the President yesterday from Easton, and must express my regret that your communication was not made at an earlier day. "Very respectfully, Your obedient servant, A. H. REEDER. Hon. W. L. MAYER, Secretary of State, Washington."

The Attorney General addressed letters similar to that above of the Secretary of State, to each of the associate justices and the United States attorney implicated with Gov. Reeder.

The expense of the jurors, poor and criminals, amount to the enormous sum of \$1,799 22. The purchase of a tract of land for a Poor Farm, has increased the indebtedness of the county \$1,800. The delinquent county Revenue runs up to the unprecedented amount of \$1,800. In addition to this, the county owes \$850 on the stock of the Port Wayne and Chicago Railroad. Were these amounts available, they would reduce the indebtedness of the county about one half. In order to pay off the indebtedness and the current expenses, the per cent for county purposes will have to be slightly increased over what it was last year, which will be cheerfully paid by the greater portion of those who are not delinquent.
