Business Retarded by Traffic Congestion and Labor Questions.

Corn Making Sensational Gains and Wheat Sympathetically Following in its Wake—Influence of President's Message Most Assuring.

NEW YORK, Dec. 7.—Dun's Weekly Review of Trade today says:

If any overcautious investor, manufacturer, or business man felt the least anxiety regarding legislation at the present session of congress, President Roosevelt's calm and temperate counsel must have been most reassuring. There is little evidence of conservatism, however, in the vigorous prosecution of work, productive capacity promising to reach much broader limits early next year.

Staple products continue advancing, corn making a most sensational gain. Extraordinarily high prices for this cereal tempted many traders to sell future contracts in expectation of a sharp reaction, but a further violent rise to the highest price for many years compelled covering at severe losses.

Wheat was also sharply advanced to the best price of the season, largely through sympathy with corn, for which it was freely substituted. Poor weather for the new crop winter wheat and liberal milling demands were also strengthening factors, besides exports from all ports of the United States, amounting to 4,815,752 bushels for the week, against 3,255,211 a year ago.

Funny Corner in Squashes.

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., Dec. 6.—A Boston commission merchant has unintentionally cornered the squash market in the northwest. Just before Thanksgiving he bought eight carloads of squashes here and shipped them to Boston. The result was that the local supply was soon used up and there is not a squash left except 200 dozen owned by a farmer, who is holding out for \$200, which would mean a retail price of 25c a piece.

Capture of 250 Boers.

PRETORIA, Dec. 6.—The largest capture of Boers made in many months occurred yesterday, when three columns secured an aggregate of 250 prisoners. Gen. Bruce Hamilton, near Emmelo; Major Dawkins, in the Waterbury district, and Gen. Methuen, in northwest Transvaal, rounded up three laagers, with only a few casualties to either side.

Search For Oil a Failure.

LAPORTE, Ind., Dec. 6.—The third well which is being sunk in the vicinity of Wanatah, this county, in search of oil will be abandoned in a few days if a strike is not made. The drill in the two wells abandoned struck neither gas nor oil and the field is not believed to be promising for a yield of either.

STABBED BY PLAYMATE

Eleven-Year-Old Boy Kills His School Companion in Kentucky.

NEWPORT, Ky., Dec. 5.—Joseph Creelman, 8 years old, was stabbed to death at noon yesterday by Eddie Armines, aged 11. The latter is under arrest.

The boys had a trivial quarrel in the schoolroom, and while on their way home from the noon recess it was renewed. A third boy, taking the part of Creelman, threw a piece of brick, which struck Armines on the head. At that moment Creelman ran up to him and was stabbed. In fifteen minutes he was dead. The Armines boy went to the fire engine house where his uncle is captain. His uncle

surrendered him to the police. "Creelman missed his reading lesson," said Armines, "and was sent to the foot of the class. He told me about it, but I said to him that I did not care, and that made him mad. The teacher made him sit at the blackboard and I laughed at him. He shook his fist at me and when school was out he cursed me. I started for the engine house, and Plummer threw a brick at me, and Creelman ran up and grabbed me by the arms. I did not think the brick was thrown at me until it hit me on the hand. Then I stuck the knife out easy and heard his coat rip."

Both boys belong to excellent families.

CHILE BUYS SHIPS

Argentine Follows Suit and There is Fair Prospect of War.

NEW YORK, Dec. 5.—An official announcement has been made here that Chile has purchased from the Lairds in England two torpedo boat destroyers, for which they paid £70,000, not including artillery, says the Euenos Ayres (Argentine) correspondent of the Herald. The purchase of these vessels is considered here as being a violation of the agreement of both republics not to increase their navies. Argentina, as a result of Chile's action, has decided to purchase a battleship of 11,000 tons, and has instructed one of the ministers in Europe to enter into negotiations for the purchase of the vessel. It is believed that the ship will be ready for service next May.

It is announced that the Chilean minister to Argentina, Senor Concha Subercaseaux, has postponed his intended trip to the Chilean capital to consult his government in reference to the pending trouble.

The Argentine government has received no reply from Chile. It is believed that the Chilean administration will propose an evacuation of the disputed territory by the forces of both republics until the decision of the boundary question is announced by the British government, to which it has been referred for arbitration.

It is understood that the Chilean government wishes to let matters drift along and try to avoid an actual conflict with Argentina and yet refrain from making a frank explanation. Argentina has decided to insist upon obtaining a response from Chile that will clear away the unsatisfactory features of the case.

Battle of the Races.

ANDALUSIA, Ala., Dec. 5.—Word has just reached here that a race riot followed the killing of Fate Atkinson and J. W. Dorsey by a negro at Opp last evening. Two negroes have been found dead. The officers there have wired here for the sheriff and dogs and have also wired to River Falls for dogs. A posse is being organized here to go to Opp at once.

Fearful Accident in Arkansas.

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Dec. 6.—Three persons were killed and forty injured in a head-on collision between two passenger trains on the St. Louis, Iron Mountain & Southern Railroad near Malvern last night. The three persons killed and most of those injured were passengers in the negro coaches.

Blame for Wabash Wreck.

ADRIN, Mich., Dec. 5.—The coroner's jury yesterday found that the disastrous collision on the Wabash railroad near Seneca last Wednesday night between trains No. 13 and 4 was caused by the negligence of the officials of the Wabash railroad company and the trainmen of train No. 4.

Goat Fatally Injures Woman.

MATTOON, Ill., Dec. 7.—While Mrs. Henry Frieze, 70 years old, the wife of a farmer of Stewardson, Shelby county, was hanging up clothes in her yard, a pet goat butted her to the ground. Her hip bone was broken, and she will die. The animal never showed viciousness before.

SOUTHERN CHIVALRY

Alleged Insult to Young Girl Leads to Tragedy.

All Parties Connected With Virginia Shooting Affray Belong to the First Families of the Old Dominion—One is Dead, Two are Wounded.

RICHMOND, Va., Dec. 5.—An alleged insult to a woman and the resort to the ancient Virginia code of honor led to a tragedy in which Herbert Marks, of New York and son of Marius Marks, president of the American Telephone company, killed Wm. P. Taylor and badly wounded J. Q. Stiff and Wm. Heflin.

Marks surrendered to the sheriff and is now in jail, although the coroner's jury has acquitted him of criminal responsibility. There are many threats of violence, and Marks will leave at once for his home in New York.

Marks was reported to have made an insulting remark Thanksgiving night to Miss Rose Taylor, the 17-year-old daughter of the late Dr. T. L. Taylor. She is an acknowledged belle and beauty. Her cousin, Wm. P. Taylor, who was also highly connected, was said to have been deeply in love with her. Information of the alleged insult reached young Taylor, who with personal friends, J. Q. Stiff and Wm. Heflin and other leading young men in the county, went to Marks' home that same night with the avowed purpose of giving him a dressing of tar and feathers. They did not find Marks. They went again to his home last night, fully armed.

Marks was seated at a table in the library writing when the window was smashed in. At the muzzle of a gun he was ordered to throw up his hands. Marks sprang into a dark room, but immediately another window was smashed, and before he could escape Stiff crawled into the room. Marks fired, wounding Stiff, who fell back. Marks then fled from the back door, firing as he went, this time wounding Heflin.

GERMAN TARIFF

Much Talk in the Reichstag About "American Peril."

BERLIN, Dec. 5.—The "American Peril" was again the dominant note in the tariff debate in the reichstag today. Dr. Paasche of Halle university, who recently visited the United States in order to make a special study of social and industrial conditions was one of the principal speakers. He warned the reichstag of "the grave danger which threatened Germany from America" and urged effective measures to avert it. He declared Germany would get more by "showing her teeth" to the United States than in any other way.

Herr Goethein, secretary of the chamber of commerce of Breslau and a freetrader, warned the reichstag against adopting defensive legislation directed at the United States, as Dr. Paasche demanded. Herr Goethein referred to the importance of the trade relations between Germany and the United States, adding: "Our exports last year to the United States were larger than those of any preceding year. Many people in Germany demand a tariff war on the United States, especially the iron men, who complain of the high tariff of the United States. While we should not try to avoid a tariff war under all circumstances, still let us not play with the idea that such avoidance would be unpatriotic."

Dr. Paasche laid before the reichstag statistics showing the expansion of the American manufactures and of American foreign commerce of recent years, and the enormous accumulation of wealth in the United States. He accompanied his statistics with a philosophical analysis supporting the idea that Germany's most dangerous and most immediate trade enemy was the United States. He was particularly impressed by the rapid growth of the cotton goods trade in the United States, which, he said,

now dominated the market of the world.

Regarding the paragraph in President Roosevelt's message concerning reciprocity Dr. Paasche said:

"America makes a feint of adopting a policy of more liberal commercial treaties, but she is determined to abandon nothing of her protective system. What would it profit us if we got a slight reduction of duties which are now absolutely prohibitive? In spite of this our 'treatyites' say we do not dare to raise our duties. The Yankee has not a trace of such sentimental politics."

Dr. Paasche declared that foreign nations hedged themselves round with a circle of protective duties and Germany must do the same. It was by such means that the United States had so developed her resources.

Some maintained, he said, that Germany must not antagonize the United States. He answered that the United States would not understand such a contention and Germany would get more from the United States by showing her teeth than by displaying sentiment.
