Carriers to Keep Records Instructions have been received from Washington requiring all the City Mail Carriers to count and weigh every piece of mail which they deliver this week. They must keep a record of each separate class of mail, count the stops they make, get percent of patrons having mail receipts, register the number of miles the walk on each of their three trips daily, the number of boxes they collect from, the number of square miles served, the population and number of patrons and various other details. They do not have to count the steps taken. On Wednesday they will keep trace of their rate of speed in classifying their mail, or the number of pieces they pigeon-hole per minute. These details will be a part of the statistical report issued from the Department at Washington and will enable Uncle Sam to keep an eye on how well his hands are doing the chores.

ROAD HOUSES AT \$50 PER IN LIQUOR BILL

EXTREME OF VICIOUSNESS APPEARS IN THE MEASURE FOR THE CONTROL OF THE SALOON

NEW CONSTITUTION.

The United States Supreme Court Will Have a Big Laugh One Day at Tom Marshall Thinks Writer.

Indianapolis, Ind., March 2.—Some day when the supreme court of the United States gets the appeal of the people of the state of Indiana and takes up the case of the people against the Tom Marshall constitution and the Democratic party caucus method of amending the state's organic law to suit the political needs of an ambitious governor, the learned justices of the most august tribunal of the world will enjoy a hearty laugh. And this laugh will not be at the expense of the people, but will be caused by the supreme audacity, partisan folly and presumptions assumption of the individual who promulgated the one-man-before-breakfast constitution, and the ridiculous arrogance and mistaken activity of the Democratic legislative caucus which took on the obligation and responsibilities of a constitutional convention at the suggestion of a governor who desires to post as the maker of great charters in the eye of an awe-struck people.

The Marshall constitution bill passed the senate duly and in the road roller style which, in these final fateful days, is so much the Democratic rule. Senator Powers, a judge on the Democratic side, not only spoke against the Marshall constitution, and the road-rolling of organic law by party caucuses, but he vetoed the Republicans against the same.

Of course the house Democrats are standing bunched and ready to run away with the Marshall constitution as they have been instructed to do. The care of the Democratic member are even now cooked for the sound of the crack of the governor's whip, and they will trot along when the time comes to rob the people of their right to have a say in the new constitution of the state.

"Give the Marshall constitution full plenty of rope and he will choke himself to death," says the Taggart Democrats. And strange is it may seem, these Democrats are cheerful over the prospect.

Regulating Liquor Sales.

The senate regulation bill on liquor has passed the house, as amended. Probably this bill beats the record for jokers and for provisions that absolutely shut out the temperance people and give it all to the wets. This bill, as amended, provides punishment for the dry who signs a remonstrance under irregular conditions. It provides that county commissioners and city councils shall decide as to the limitation of saloons to population, and as to the license fees. Of course the \$700 license was cut out, and under the bill no license can be more than \$500. In thirty days after the bill becomes a law, nobody will have the power either to limit the saloons or to let a saloon to 1,000, but is one to 500, unless the local authorities fix the limit differently. Also, the manner of computing the population is a ridiculous and fraudulent scheme to base the estimate on the rate of five for every voter voting for the man receiving the highest aggregate of votes at the last preceding election. This means the addition of one-fifth to the population in estimating for the limitation of saloons. The standard for computing population from votes cast, is in the ratio of three and seven eighths to one. It would not do to accept the scientific basis, for to do so would mean a fair shake for the temperance people, and the slight reduction of the number of saloons to be permitted.

Regulation upward is the Democratic scheme, and in all respects the bill conforms to that idea. It conflicts in many places with the Nicholson law, and with the Hoore remonstrance law, and of course will have the effect of weakening those laws. It would make the election of county commissioners and city and town councils absolutely the burning wet or dry issue, at every local election. It would plunge the saloon further into politics than ever before.

The provision that would permit liquor dealers to apply for license under the old law, and to have their license application pending at the time the new laws went into effect thus receiving their licenses regard

less of the limitation that might later be put on saloons by local officer is as unfair, fraudulent and vicious as is the supplementary provision that would perpetuate all these licenses once they had been granted. For the regulation bill demands that the liquor license shall be a vested right of the holder, to be transferred by him to any other person, or from one location to another, and to be renewed at his demand regardless of the limitation on the number of saloons.

The bill denounced by several Democrats in debate when it passed the house, and they proclaimed that it was not the Democratic platform bill in any sense whatever. But the Democrats, almost without exception lined up and voted for the bill because the temperance people got no hearing on the bill at any stage.

It probably will be found, after all is said and done, that the \$50 license for saloons outside certain limits of cities and towns—roadhouses, in other words, is the extreme viciousness in the whole measure.
