SHOT IN FACE.

Alva Jackman, 12 Year Boy Gets 22 Ball in Jaw and Still Lives.

Alva Jackman, a 12 year old boy living about six miles north of Plymouth, was accidentally shot in the face with a 22 caliber revolver Tuesday about noon and yet was not killed.

Herbert Espieh, 17 years old, was cleaning his revolver and "thought it was unloaded." He asked Jackman to get him some oil. Alva said "he wouldn't do it, whereupon Herbert drew his revolver on him in fun and said, "I'll shoot you if you don't," and pulled the trigger.

The revolver fired a 22 caliber ball which struck Alva in the jaw just under the nose, knocked out a front tooth and lodged in the bone of the jaw. Dr. Stephens was called and after probing, extracted the battered ball. The boy seems to feel little effect of the wound, though if it had not struck his jaw bone he would have been killed.
