Street Cleaning. The report of the Street-cleaning Department of 1874 has been issued in neat pamphlet form. The following extracts show the result of the year's work: The total amount placed to the credit of the Street-cleaning Department during the year was \$197,183.80; taxes and borrowed money, \$128,190.30; and receipts for extra hauling, sale of scrap, hells made and paid for, sale of manure, horses, repairing tools and keeping officers' horses, \$8,988.80. The total expenditures amounted to \$138,861.68, composed of the following items: Debt incurred by the department to begin with in the year 1874 and paid this year, \$11,205.99; pay-rolls, \$104,300.56; to J. W. Mitchell, by order of Council, \$372; salary of Superintendent, \$2,000; for horse-feed, \$12,378.82; apparatus, \$2,322.70; horses, shoeing and harness, \$2,389.11; stable and stable repairs, \$701.00; miscellaneous supplies, \$1,400.43; and contingencies, \$109.88.

There are 70 wagons and 22 carts, all told. The stable contains 89 horses and 7 mules, all fit for service. Only 3 horses have been purchased outright—\$385.50 for the lot; 3 have been sold in good condition, 6 others exchanged or sold, realizing in the aggregate \$945.80. Although the apparent condition of the horses is excellent, it must be remembered that many are veterans, having been in constant service since the origin of this Department, and are old and liable to be unfit for use at any time. No deaths have occurred, and no dangerous diseases or accidents reached the stable. The price of feed is fully 33 1/2 per cent. greater than last year.

The cost of keeping each horse per day is 32.72 cents; last year it was 31.4 cents. From the total expenditures, as previously shown, there should be deducted \$945.80, sale of horses; \$8,979.19, sale of street dirt, etc.; and placed in Treasury to credit of this fund; cost of keeping officers' horses and repairing tools for Board of Improvements, \$8,519.28; amount of old debt paid this year, \$11,205.99; and money due for bills made and not paid for, \$9,017.77—in order to show the net cost of cleaning the streets for the year, which is \$107,303.65. Net cost for 1873 was \$127,994.93.

The work performed by this Department was the collecting and depositing at different places of 89,650 loads of dirt and 1,828 loads of ashes; 8,249 loads of garbage were collected and delivered to the city contractors at their boats; 8,974 loads of refuse were taken from catch-basins at the expense of the Sewerage Commission, but hauled away at our cost.

The report shows a considerable reduction of the expense of last year.
