IOWA HISTORY ESSENTIAL.

Applicants for Positions at St. Louis Must Comply With Requirements.

The Iowa World's Fair commissioners at a recent meeting decided to require certain educational qualifications of all applicants seeking employment during the World's Fair at St. Louis. The Iowa appointees will be expected to be versed in the history of the Hawkeye state, and be able to tell all about the vast resources of the state and a knowledge of the political history of the state will also be necessary.

Dr. S. Bailey, of Mt. Airy, the commissioner for the eighth district, is constantly in receipt of letters from applicants who desire these positions. He has prepared a partial list of questions which will be asked the applicants for positions, and from this list it will be seen that a general knowledge of Iowa and Iowa affairs will be required of all applicants seeking appointments. The list follows:

- Give names of state officers.
- Name the judges of the supreme court.
- Name the United States senators and representatives.
- Name all the counties in the state and at least eighty per cent of the county seats.
- Give the number of square miles and the number of acres in the state.
- State mineral resources, industries, etc.
- Number of school buildings and colleges and give location of colleges.
- Give the state institutions and tell where they are located.
- Annual amount of funds for educational purposes.
- Name the principal cities and give population of each and principal industries.
- Number of daily and weekly newspapers and total publications.
- Number of railroads in Iowa and total mileage.
- Number of congressional districts and the countries comprising each district.
- Name the principal rivers of the state.

TO PENSION ALL VETERANS.

Concerted Movement Among Old Soldiers to Secure Pensions for Every Veteran.

Sioux City, Oct. 3.—The G. A. R. Posts of Iowa are called upon by L. B. Raymond, commander of the Iowa department, to lend every aid that is desired by the pension committee of the national organization in its efforts to secure an amendment to the pension laws providing for the payment of a monthly pension of \$12 to every veteran over 62 years of age.

With a general order issued by Commander Raymond, which was received yesterday morning by Colonel M. L. Davis, past department commander for Iowa, are enclosed copies of general orders No. 1 issued by General John C. Black, commander-in-chief of the Grand Army of the Republic, and a circular letter No. 1 also issued by the commander, in-chief, both of which called attention to the projected amendment to the pension laws, as endorsed by the national encampment of the G. A. R.

The resolution which was adopted by the thirty-seventh national encampment explains the proposition and is as follows:

Resolved, That the committee on pensions to be appointed for the ensuing year be and they are hereby directed to present to congress for passage a bill which, while not disturbing the beneficent provisions of existing law shall provide that every existing survivor of the war of 1861-1865, who served for a period of ninety days and who has passed at the rate of \$12 per month, and that a pension of the same amount be paid to the worthy widow of such soldier, when deceased who was married to such soldier prior to the 27th of June, A. D. 1890.

General Black says in his circular: "The Grand Army of the Republic has set itself this year to the accomplishment of a notable undertaking. Let us agitate the matter and inform our fellow citizens until they are convinced of the justice and wisdom of these resolutions. Let us set about this with a resolute hope that at the end of the year the widow and our dependent comrade will say: 'Well done, faithful comrades, tried and true.'"
