THE FIRE BUGS ARE CAUGHT. Two Young Men Bound Over For Starting the Recent Conflagration in Charlton.

Henry Schotte, aged 28 years, a son of Chas. Schotte, and Harley Waynick, aged 24 years, a son of Constable Henry Waynick, were arrested last Monday, charged with setting fire to the buildings which burned at the southwest corner of the square last week. The young men have waived their hearing before the mayor and are bound over to the grand jury, which will meet on August 29, under bonds of \$2,500 each. They are now in jail, and though nothing has been made public by a trial, it is said that they have confessed fully to the officers, and it now only remains for the law to take its course. A plea of insanity is talked of, to keep the young men from going to the penitentiary. It is said that neither of the boys are very bright mentally, but the opinion is expressed by many that insanity would hardly take the same course at exactly the same time in two different minds. The crime incendiarism is a very serious one, and the business men of the city, as well as the insurance companies with investments here, demand that it be stopped at whatever cost.—Charlton Herald.

LEFT HIM HIS GRIP. Iowa Stockman Robbed of \$10,000 in Chicago Saturday.

Chicago, May 16.—Alonzo Bristow of Bedford, Iowa, has reported to the police the loss of \$10,700 which he received Saturday from the sale of eighty-three horses at the Union Stock Yards. He says the money was in a small satchel, and that the thief slashed the side of the bag with a knife, thereby enabling him to insert his hand and purloin the two packages of greenbacks. Bristow arrived in Chicago Friday night and stayed at the City Hotel, Sixteenth and State streets. He went to the stockyards the next morning and disposed of the horses, which belonged to his brother a wealthy stock breeder. After cashing a check for \$10,700 he says he went to the Boston Oyster House, Madison and Clark streets, where he ate supper. Before entering the restaurant he bought the satchel to put the money in, as he did not like, he says, to carry that large amount in his pocket for fear of losing it or having his pocket picked. He placed the money in the satchel before leaving the restaurant, and he is of the opinion that his actions were seen. From the restaurant he went to the City Hotel to get some articles which he had left, and from there he went to the Union depot in Canal street to take a train for Iowa. On arriving at the depot, he told the police, he discovered that the satchel had been cut and the contents taken. The satchel was not out of his hands, he says from the time the money was put in it until he discovered the loss.
