John Dickerhoff, who was convicted in the Polk county criminal court and sentenced to six years in the penitentiary for procuring and the attempt to ruin the Tolman sisters in his house of ill-fame, was released from the penitentiary Thursday on an appeal bond of \$3,500 and is now at liberty, pending the action of the supreme court. As will be remembered an appeal was made for a rehearing after his conviction June 8th, on the grounds that Judge McHenry permitted the introduction of the testimony of Mrs. Dickerhoff pointing toward a conspiracy in which John Dickerhoff was implicated. Dickerhoff was, at the time of the appeal, unable to furnish the required bond, hence was taken to prison. It is not known what the action of the supreme court will be in the matter, but it is hoped by the people of this community that Dickerhoff will be unsuccessful in the attempt for a rehearing, and that he will be compelled to serve out the entire extent of the six years sentence.—Lamoni Chronicle.
