### Stole Mrs. Teale's Clothes.

Mrs. Mabel Jackson, aged 18, better known here as Mabel Connolly, left Mt. Ayr on Wednesday morning train, wearing a large amount of first-class apparel belonging to Mrs. Charles Teale. She returned last evening from St. Joseph in charge of Sheriff H. M. Miller.

Bert Williams, aged 16, a son of Sam Williams, left on the same train, and rumor connected the two disappearances. However, young Williams' mother works in a restaurant in South St. Joseph, and he may have gone merely to visit her. His father was considerably worked up and was consulting the officers in regard to tracing the boy's whereabouts. Mrs. Jackson, whose girlhood was spent in Mt. Ayr, returned to this place from Kansas City a few months ago. She was married while living in Kansas City, but does not live with her husband.

Mrs. Jackson has been working at the Teale home. She left the house between 8 and 9 o'clock Tuesday evening to spend the night with a girl friend. This friend says that when Mrs. Jackson dressed Wednesday morning to go to the train almost every article of apparel she put on was from Mrs. Teale's wardrobe, including skirts and undershirts, a pair of fine shoes, and an expensive cloak. The total value of the property taken is about \$50. It is thought by Mrs. Teale that the wearing apparel was got out of the house via an upstairs window, as Mrs. Jackson carried only a grip with her when she left the house.

About 400 people had gathered at the depot last evening to greet Sheriff Miller and his fair charge, and it was with difficulty that the sheriff could push his

way down town. The proceedings were in Justice J. N. Lineburg's court, County Attorney Fuller appearing for the state and A. I. Smith for the defendant. Mrs. Teale had itemized \$27.50 worth of property in her information. Mr. Smith secured for his client a continuance until 2 o'clock this afternoon, the bail bond being fixed at \$100, which Mrs. Jackson and two of her relatives gave by depositing their gold watches. The worries of the day had greatly affected Mrs. Jackson, and she was attacked by a fainting spell during the proceedings in court last evening.

Mrs. Jackson had been arrested by the St. Joseph chief of police on a telegraphic order from Sheriff Miller within an hour or two after she reached that city.—Mt. Ayr News.
