MARRIED SIXTY-THREE YEARS.

J. C. Galford and Wife, of Allerton, Claim 153 Descendants, 129 Being Still Living.

Eleven children born, seven living; sixty grandchildren born, forty living; eight great-grand children living; two great-great-grand children living; total descendants born, 153; total living, 129. This is the record of the descendants of Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Galford, of Allerton, who celebrated their 60th wedding anniversary the 16th of last month.

Mr. and Mrs. Galford is the oldest couple living in Allerton and one of the oldest married couples in the state. They are most highly respected by all their acquaintances and have a record that few couples can equal. They have lived together sixty-six years. To them was born eleven children, seven of whom are living. There were sixty grandchildren born, forty of whom are living. Eighty great-grandchildren are living two great-great-grandchildren, making a total of 153 descendants of this aged couple, 129 of whom live today to honor and revere the name of their parents. This great family is scattered all over the western states and in the 129 living, only one son resides in Allerton and was near enough to be present with his wife to celebrate this 60th wedding anniversary. This son has no children, thus leaving to the others all the more of the great family. It is a Roosevelt family, in truth, and yet Mr. Galford is a life long democrat and a Bryan democrat at that, giving a dinner in his honor when he was at Allerton to address the Chautauqua a year ago.

Mr. Galford, was born in Pike county, Ohio, Dec. 31, 1818. He served through the war in an Ohio regiment and is a grandson of two Revolutionary war heroes. He moved with his family to Iowa in 1866 and to Allerton in 1878.

Mrs. Galford, Miss Elizabeth Anderson, was born in Jackson county, Ohio, December 23, 1820.

This couple was married in Pike county, Ohio, January 13, 1839. They are both ardent christians being members of the Baptist church. They live alone in a comfortable home in Allerton where they have all the comforts of life they can wish for. They keep a cow, chickens and make garden, doing their own work. Their health is reasonably good and they both enjoy out door life when they weather permits.

They have lived a simple life, honest, sturdy and active in every thing their community that they could take part in until old age has necessitated their living more retired. Mr. Galford has voted for every candidate for president since 1840 and still takes an active part in politics.

We doubt if there are many couples in Iowa who can show a more remarkable record than theirs, and all Iowans will join in congratulating them upon their long married life and wishing for them many more years of happiness. —Keokuk Democrat.

Hiawatha Incubator



The man or woman who has had some experience with Incubators and has had a hot water machine spring a leak in the middle of a hatch, can appreciate the method used in heating the Hiawatha. It is heated by a common kerosene lamp. The fumes from the lamp can in no way get into the egg chamber. Such fumes quickly kill the young chick and the chick within the shell.
