

THE P. & O. CANTON Jewel Hammock Cultivator



The most popular hammock seat cultivator on the market. It has all the points which entitle it to first place among modern cultivators. The balance lever adjusts the poise of the frame to suit the weight of the operator. The crank shaft, operated by balance lever, adjusts both sides alike, relieving the axles from any twisting strain. The seat is adjustable, suspended from malleable supports, making it impossible to swing loose. The gangs are lifted and controlled by a pendulum and rock arm device, as nearly self-raising as practical to make them, and are responsive to the lightest touch. The depth can be varied by slight foot pressure, as the gangs are given an elastic perpendicular range of movement by means of cushion springs. One of the attractive features is the depth regulating device on the rock arms, which gives added adjustment to that allowed by the cushion springs. Adjustable steel evener, telescope axle, 44 inch staggered wheels, fitted with dust-proof boxes and screw-caps. Can be converted into a surface cultivator by attaching the Jewel Surface Attachment, a change which can be accomplished without drilling holes.
