NEW LAW IS POPULAR

It is Believed That Teachers Will be Satisfied After New System Has Been Given Fair Trial.

If reports received from over the state amount to anything, county superintendents at least are hailing with joy the law which goes into effect October 1, relieving them of the work of correcting examination papers of those who apply for teachers' certificates. After that time all questions will be submitted by the state board of education, and the papers will also be graded at Des Moines instead of by the superintendents in the various counties. The first provision of the new law will be no innovation in many parts of the state, as a large number of county superintendents have been using for years the lists of questions formulated by the state educational board, although they have not been required by law to do so. It is the second essential of the law which appeals pleasantly to county superintendents for the responsibility of granting or refusing certificates is lifted from their shoulders. The Cedar Rapids Gazette puts it very well as follows:

"It will remove from superintendents the temptation to issue certificates to young ladies whose fathers may be influential in politics, while the young ladies do not possess the necessary qualifications to teach.

"In this respect the new law will be a blessing. Temptation will be removed from the weak or designing superintendent, and the girl without influential friends will fare as well as the rich and highly connected young lady. All papers will look alike to the examining board, and honors will be distributed with equal justice to all. In this respect, however, it may be said that many an excellent and high class teacher will not always make the highest grades in an examination. All certificates issued by the county superintendent before October will be valid until the date of their expiration, and it is probably that all over Iowa school ma'ams and masters will flock to the superintendents like doves to the windows. They will wish to put off the inevitable day as long as possible. It is going to be pretty tough on some of the old teachers whose certificates have been renewed from year to year without examination, to get down to answering lists of questions pertaining to reading, writing, music, didactics, arithmetic, history, civil government, political economy, physiology, grammar, algebra and natural philosophy. But they will have to try when the certificates issued by the county superintendent expires, if they wish to continue to teach."

The new law was vigorously opposed by the teachers of the state when it was up for passage in the legislature last winter. A petition, signed by many of the teachers of Des Moines county, was presented to Senator Fred N. Smith and Representative Henry Ritter, asking them to use their influence against the passage of the bill in the legislature. In other parts of the state it was equally unpopular among the teachers. Now that it is soon to go into effect, there is said to be a feeling of fear among the pedagogues of the state. County Superintendent Howard Mathews recently stated that he believed many of the best teachers in the county would worry about the examination next year until the institute is over and they receive word that they will be permitted to teach again as usual. He does not anticipate that the new law will work any hardships upon the teachers, and believes that after they have once become accustomed to the system it will be entirely satisfactory to them. In this county the lists of questions compiled by the state educational board for teachers' examinations have been used for several years, and these lists have always been very reasonable, the superintendent states. Mr. Mathews is of the opinion that the examiners will use the same good judgment in grading papers as they have in formulating examination questions.

Under the new system the county normal will be held as usual, the only difference being that the papers will be sent to Des Moines to be graded, and certificates will be issued from the state superintendent's office.
