

Mail carriers have no authority to trespass upon private property and the postal laws give them no special rights as regard the use of public roads. The law prohibits any willful interference with the performance of postal service, but such prohibition does not authorize mail carriers to disregard state laws or municipal ordinances as regards the use of the public roads, nor authorizes them to willfully interfere with the rightful use of public roads, by both parties.

The postoffice department in Washington has issued an order that may be of interest to merchants and mail carriers. All matter that is mailable under the new postal law, up to four pounds in weight, must be passed in at the postoffice window to be weighed, and the stamps placed thereon at the rate of one cent for each ounce of merchandise. The carrier is forbidden to take ten cents from the shipper for delivering the package not stamped. The carrier who disobeys this ruling is liable to prosecution and possibly to dismissal. Iowa Corn

At this time the prospect is that the Iowa corn crop for the year 1906 will amount to 400,000,000 bushels.

The last great big corn crop was in the year 1900. But the crop of this year gives a better prospect than the crop of 1900 in August of that year. The acreage of this year is larger and the seed more carefully selected.

The non-corn growing states can scarcely realize that Iowa is going to produce 400,000,000 bushels of yellow corn this year. But it is a fact.

At 25 cents a bushel the yield in money would be \$100,000,000, has enough to dig the Panama canal, a sum larger than the Suez canal. Iowa has not sold any corn at 25 cents per bushel for a number of years and the price will be greater than that this year, especially if the corn is fed to cattle and hogs.

The farmer of Iowa wears a smile as broad as a Panama hat. He only asks that the politician be made to keep his mouth shut. The farmer and his corn crop will do the rest.

Iowa is going to demonstrate for the fiftieth time that this is the great agricultural state of the forty-six states comprising the union.


