Important Court Decision.

A case of large importance to Tingley township and to other townships in the that of E. H. Parce, township clerk, vs. T. W. Darbyshire, a trustee of Tingley township. Judge Towner in overruling a demurrer at the last term had gone to the merits of the case, and Judge Evans on Wednesday took exactly the same view, giving Mr. Parce for the benefit of the township \$124. The case was tried to a jury, but after the evidence was in the court after a motion of the plaintiff's attorneys instructed the jury to find for the plaintiff. Mr. Darbyshire, who was a trustee of the township had taken a job of overseeing the road work, and had collected the pay. The suit was brought to compel him to return the money. Judge Evans pointed out that the course of trustees, councilmen, directors or supervisors in hiring themselves to do public work is against public policy and moreover is directly contrary to the statute. Should he rule that pay could not be collected by law, but that when once it was paid it could not be recovered, the court pointed out, he would merely be instructing the officers how to evade the law. Similar cases will be brought, it is said, in Liberty and Riley townships, and perhaps in others. The case decided by Judge Evans will be carried up to the supreme court.—Mt. Ayr News.


