



### A Valuable Team Stolen.

On Wednesday evening of last week a valuable team belonging to C. A. Carlson, of Woodland, attached to a bob sled, was stolen from the southwest corner of the square at Lineville between 6 and 7 o'clock. Mr. Carlson in company with his neighbor, Nick Belvel, came to town that day and the team was put up at Hardy Wasson's livery barn in South Lineville. When about ready to leave for home, Belvel went to the barn had the team hitched up and drove it to the southwest corner of the square, tied it there to the hitch-rack where he left them to hunt up Carlson. A few minutes later the team and sled were missing and thus far no positive clew to their whereabouts has been discovered. It was thought at first that some person or persons had taken the rig for a sleigh-ride or a joke and would soon return it; but as the hours wore away and the team did not materialize the owner became convinced that it had been stolen. The track of the sled was followed south and east from town for several miles, the thief taking the roads least traveled, but when it reached the main traveled road north of Ravanna it could no longer be traced. Mr. Carlson secured the services of sheriff Minter, of Mercer county and a vigorous pursuit of the thief and team was started, but thus far they have not been captured. The team was composed of a blue-roan gelding and a brown mare valued at \$300. The sled was nearly new and carried a new wagon box and a spring seat. In the box were a pair of horse-blankets, laprobes, and a set of double harness belonging to Nick Belvel. Up to this writing no report has been received from the pursuers since they reached Kirksville, Mo., but many unfounded reports of the capture of the thief and recovery of the team have been in circulation.—Lineville Tribune.

### A PITIFUL CASE.

#### Orville Hursey Dies of Exposure and Lack of Food.

Mr. Robert Hursey, who resides in this township, 2 1/2 miles northwest of town, received a letter on last Saturday, enclosing a picture of a dead boy, from the authorities at Griswold, Iowa. He recognized the picture as that of his only son, aged about 22 years, who had left home some months ago, of whose whereabouts the father was ignorant. He took the first train for Griswold and returned to Lineville Monday evening bringing the remains of his son here for interment. From him we learn that Orville in company with another young man, reached Griswold on a freight train on Sunday, Jan. 13th. On going into the depot, Orville fell unconscious. He was carried to a hotel and kindly cared for by the authorities and sympathetic people, but died on Tuesday following, not having regained consciousness after his collapse at the depot. Nothing was found on his person to prove his identity and his companion who arrived with him from Griswold did not know his name or place of residence. Fred Merrick, son of J. C. Merrick, who resides on the Wm. Petty farm west of town, now lives a few miles from Griswold and happened to be in that town on the day following the boy's death and prompted by curiosity visited the undertaking rooms and viewed the body. He was at once impressed with the belief that he had known the dead boy, but was unable to recall his name or the recollection of where he had seen him. On his way home, however, his memory revived and he at once became convinced that the body he had seen was that of the Hursey boy he had known here. He at once returned to Griswold and informed the authorities of his belief and the letter to the boy's father here was the result.

The physicians at Griswold informed Mr. Hursey that the immediate cause of the boy's death was uric acid of the blood induced by exposure and want of food. Mr. and Mrs. Hursey have three daughters, but Orville was their only son. They have the sympathy of the community in their bereavement.

The funeral was held on Tuesday and the burial was at the Yingling graveyard, three miles west of Lineville.—Lineville Tribune.





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
