

### Court Reporters Use Graphophones.

B. O. Brington and Jasper Ferguson, the court reporters, have invested in a graphophone apparatus for use in transcribing their records, of which they have purchased a supply, will be used in taking dictation, and these, when placed in another machine will repeat what has been talked into them so that it may be written out by typewriter operators.

When it is desired to extend a shorthand record, the reporter will read from his shorthand notes into the machine, and the record so made will then be simply turned over to a typewriter operator for transcription. The records after being once used, can it is stated, be shaved down and used over and over again, from 50 to 75 records being taken on a single roll.—Shenandoah Sentinel Post.
