The New Indeterminate Sentence Law.

There are 130 crimes for which the Iowa penal code provides penalties. Death is the maximum penalty for one of these—murder in the first degree. Life imprisonment is the maximum penalty for twelve others.

Under the indeterminate sentence law, the district judges are supposed no longer to fix a definite term of imprisonment for persons convicted of these 130 felonies except in cases of murder in the first degree. And under the new parole law, operating with the indeterminate sentence law, every convict sent to Ft. Madison and Anamosa after July 1, 1907, may be required to serve the maximum penalty for the felony on which he has been convicted, within the discretion of the board of parole.

There is some question as to the powers of the new board, if a convict were given a life sentence by a district judge. There is a possibility that the new law repeals the law relative to the submission of application for pardon by first degree murderers to the legislature by the governor. It is not unlikely that in any event the governor has full power to pardon first degree murders whatever the recommendation or advice of the legislature, and it is conceded that the governor has the power to refuse to follow the advice of the legislature even after it is taken.

This is purely a legal proposition, however, for the governor always has and doubtless always will follow the advice of the assembly in such cases, unless it turns out that hereafter, under the Saunders indeterminate sentence law, it will not be necessary to submit applications for pardon to the legislature at all, the opinion of the attorney general on the subject will be taken.

Secretary B. W. Garrett of the board of parole has carefully examined the penal code and has prepared a tabulated list of felonies penalized therein, together with the maximum penalty provided in each case. This list will be a part of the forthcoming booklet issued by the parole board. Of the 130 felonies the maximum penalty for one is death; for 12, life imprisonment; for two, thirty years; for four, twenty-five years; for seven, twenty years; for three, fifteen years; for thirty, ten years; for forty-six, five years; for one, six years; for three, eight years; for four, seven years, and for the other thirty, less than five years.

Assault with intent to commit murder and burning an inhabited dwelling in the day time are two felonies taking thirty years. No minimum is provided. Dynamiting, enticing a female child for prostitution, being a habitual criminal, and incest take twenty-five year maximum sentences, except that this is the minimum for a habitual criminal.

LIFE IMPRISONMENT FELONIES.
Following is a list of felonies for which the maximum penalty is life imprisonment:

- Burning inhabited dwelling in the night time.
- Burglary, armed with dangerous weapon.
- Carnal knowledge of embeccle or insane female.
- Kidnaping for ransom.
- Placing obstruction on railways.
- Perjury of accused in murder cases.
- Rape.
- Subornation of perjury in murder case.
- Train robbery.
- Murder.
- Murder in second degree.
- Dynamiting when death is caused.
- Treason.

Assume that an accused person is convicted of train robbery. The district judge, under the indeterminate sentence law, sentences him, not for a term of years, but simply to the penitentiary, or reformatory if he be under thirty years of age. Under the rules adopted by the board of parole his case becomes subject to consideration after eleven months. He may then be paroled, at the discretion of the board, which has full power. It may keep him in the penitentiary or reformatory for life if it sees fit. But after he is paroled, within a year he may be recommended to the governor for pardon.

This is the whole operation of the new system. The parole board has adopted rules to govern convicts who are paroled, which provide that he must make monthly report and conduct himself decently. And cigarettes are tabooed by the board. The rules adopted by the board follow:

RULES OF THE BOARD

- The paroled prisoner shall proceed at once to the place of employment provided for him, and enter upon his work, and shall not change his place of employment or residence without the consent of the board of parole.
- He shall on the first day of each month, until his final release, transmit to the board a report of himself, stating whether he has been constantly at work during the preceding month, and if not employed, the reason for the same. His report must show how much he has on hand and a general statement of his surroundings and prospects. Such report must be indorsed as correct by his employer.
- He shall in all respects conduct himself honestly, avoid evil associations, spend his evenings after working hours at home, and, in general, conduct himself as an honorable and law-abiding citizen and shall totally abstain from the use of intoxicating liquors, from smoking cigarettes, and from visiting

saloons and all places of evil repute.

6. He shall while on parole, remain in the legal custody and under the control of the board.

5. He shall be liable to be retaken and again confined within the prison or reformatory from which he was paroled for any reason or reasons that are satisfactory to the board.

6. If he fails to report to the board on the first day of each month or violates any of the conditions imposed in his parole agreement, he forfeits the parole and renders himself liable to be returned at once to the institution from which he was paroled, to serve out the unexpired portion of his maximum sentence.

7. No paroled prisoner shall, during the term of his parole, leave the state.

8. The board of parole takes a lively interest in all paroled prisoners, and they need not hesitate to freely communicate with the secretary in case of sickness or otherwise. It is the intention of the board in granting a parole to give the convict the option of becoming a good respectable citizen or of serving out the unexpired portion of his maximum sentence.

Wettest July in History.

The month just ended will probably go down in history as the wettest July in the records of the local weather bureau. At least the precipitation last month was greater than in any July during the past thirteen years, according to the weather bureau records. A total of 10.20 inches of rain fell during the month, which is just 6.34 inches above the normal precipitations for July. The previous wettest July was in 1895, when 8.64 inches of rain were recorded. The year 1886 holds the record of being the driest July in the history of the Des Moines weather bureau, and during the month only .27 inches of rain fell.
