Cainsville Oil People Incorporate.

A big \$50,000 corporation was launched in Jefferson City, Tuesday. The name of the company is the "Keystone Oil and Gas Co., of Jefferson City." The stock is divided into 50,000 shares of \$1 each, and Wilson D. Althouse and Henry B. Tyson, of Norristown, Pa., and Fred Morck, of Warren, Pa., each hold 16,666 shares, and Monroe P. Belch, Leo W. Eller and W. W. Goodall, of Jefferson City, one share each.

The office of the company is located in the office of W. S. Pope in the court house. Mr. Pope is the attorney for the company. The officers are Wilson D. Althouse, president; H. B. Tyson, treasurer; and Fred Morck, secretary.

The Pennsylvania members of the company came here with the cash for the organization of the company, having two certified checks of a Pennsylvania bank for \$25,000 each.

The company will operate in Harrison and other counties on the north border of the state adjoining Iowa where they have leased lands which they expect will develop gas and oil. Daily Jefferson City Tribune.

The above is good news as it shows that the company thinks that the showing the well has made is good enough to justify them in incorporating, and it seems reasonably certain that the field will be developed as soon as possible. Of course it will take some time at best to get the necessary machinery here to take care of the oil or gas should they be found. It will also take some time to get core drills here to test the country and it will take probably six months to drill before putting down a shaft in case coal in paying quantities is found.

We understand that the company will soon make a new coal proposition in which they will give the people a chance to sell their coal rights outright. The price will range from \$20 an acre up, according to the amount of coal on the place. This looks like a good proposition as a man with a 100 acre farm will be enabled to sell his coal rights for \$2000 to \$5000 and still retain all the surface rights that he ever had and would be just that much clear cash ahead.

The company has an abundance of capital with which to thoroughly develop both the oil and coal fields in this vicinity and say they will do so if their demands are met.—Cainsville News.

Gathering Corn by Machinery.

"The Tabor Beacon tells of the successful operation of a corn picking machine in that vicinity. It says: 'Picking, shucking and cribbing 50 bushels of corn an hour may sound like a fairy story to some; but that's what three men, nine head of horses and a Deering picker are doing at Taylor Davis' farm four miles northeast of Tabor. This is the first Deering corn picker to be used in this part of Iowa and is attracting considerable attention. It takes five head of horses to pull the machine, besides two wagons and teams to haul the corn to the crib. The machine picks the corn and elevates it into the wagon.'

This picker cost \$550, but at the rate of six or eight acres a day will soon pay for itself. The day of gathering corn by hand will soon be a thing of the past."
