Five Years for Seymour Bank Wrecker.

LeRoy Ware, on Tuesday, entered his plea of guilty to one indictment for making false entries in the books of the Farmers & Drivers State Bank, of Seymour, of which he was formerly cashier, and was sentenced by Judge Towner to imprisonment in the penitentiary at Fort Madison for the term of five years at hard labor, which is the extreme penalty.

This leaves twenty-one indictments still pending against him, as follows: Three for fraudulent banking, seven for embezzlement, one for making false reports to the auditor of state, and ten for making false entries in the books of the bank, none of which indictments have been dismissed. The extreme penalty which might be imposed upon him on the indictments still pending against him, if he were to be found guilty, or were to enter pleas of guilty to all of them, would be one hundred and twenty years in the penitentiary. The twenty-one indictments were continued on his motion and at his request, and any of them might be tried at any time if he should be pardoned, or at any time after he has served the term for which he has already been sentenced.

By this method, if Ware should at any time be pardoned, he would not be released, but would immediately be returned to the custody of the sheriff of this county to await further action upon the indictments still remaining against him, and could be tried upon any one of them, while if he had pleaded guilty to all the indictments against him at this time and received sentence, he could have been pardoned from all of said sentence at one time, and would thus have been released from all indictments against him. This, however, cannot happen now, but all of said twenty-one indictments remain against him, and he may be tried on any one of them at any time when his imprisonment ceases, whether by pardon from the governor or by expiration of time. No one can prophesy as to the future, but from present indications it may be safely predicted that Mr. Ware will end his days in the penitentiary.—Corydon Times-Republican.


REMEMBER
