Oil Drillers Quit at Cainsville.

After working four or five days in an effort to recover the tools lost in the oil well, without success, all hope of recovering them was given up and work suspended for the present at least. The casing was pulled and the well abandoned. The well was about 1120 feet and it is a matter of sincere regret that the obstacles were such that it was impossible to complete the well. The company has spent a lot of money—more than \$7000—in their operations here, and have been unable to learn for a certainty whether oil is here in paying quantities or not. The drillers were paid off and left for their several homes last Friday. Mr. James Brann, the superintendent, who has had charge of the work since the first of the year, also left Sunday evening for his home at Warren, Pa. He will appear before the board of directors and make a personal explanation of the situation here, and they will then decide, says Mr. Brann, whether the company will drill any more oil wells in this vicinity or not. But it is a significant fact that a few days ago they secured a lease on land joining the property on which the oil well is located. We believe they have abandoned the oil well, but we do not believe that they will abandon this field until a thorough test has been made. The core drillers who have been drilling west of the river have finished their work there, and will soon move the machine to the east side of the river near the oil well in the hope of striking the large veins reported by Mr. Strause while drilling the oil well. As to what the core drill shows we cannot say. The largest vein reported by the representative of the company was about 22 inches, but in some way the impression is general that a much larger vein has been found but we do not know whether this is correct or not but we hope it is. During his stay here in the interests of the oil company, Mr. James Brann, the genial supt., has made many warm friends by his pleasant and courteous ways, and should the company send a man here again, we would be pleased to see Mr. Brann return.—Cainsville News.
