Hiram Wheeler Once Candidate for Governor of Iowa Now a Tramp.

FORT DODGE, Jan. 14.—Judge W. S. Kenyon, attorney general for the Illinois Central, has discovered in Chicago, Hiram Wheeler, a former republican candidate for governor of Iowa, a man broken in spirit and dependent upon the scanty bounty of his daughter. Once he owned about 3,000 acres of Iowa farm land and was a prosperous and well liked man, popular enough to receive very hearty support for the candidacy of Iowa's greatest office. Now he is unkempt, ragged, a pathetic figure who exists and is swallowed up in the great tide of humanity that calls Chicago home.

Hiram Wheeler converted his farms into money many years ago and went southwest where he lost everything. Since then he has drifted back to his daughter, and his discovery by Kenyon was occasioned by his appearance in a big legal case of the Illinois Central recently in regard to lake front land. Wheeler claimed to have a title to it, but it was found that he must have been 7 years old when he bought it if his assertions were true, and the claim was so tangled and uncertain that nothing came of it.

Figuring on Coal Shaft at Cainsville.

The latest information which we have every reason to believe is authentic, is that plans and specifications for a shaft have been sent to Mr. G. W. York, the core driller, with the request that he make an estimate of the cost. Mr. York left last week, for Nashville, Tenn., to consult a firm of engineers, and will submit his estimate to the company as soon as it can be prepared.

We presume this, with probably other estimates, will be considered by the board of directors of the company before any contracts are let.

ANOTHER OIL WELL POSSIBLE.

Mr. C. E. Beam, an oil operator, of Bartlesville, Okla., has visited this city, two or three times recently, to look over the country with a view of drilling a deep well provided he could secure sufficient acreage. Finding the land in the immediate vicinity of the city practically all leased to other parties, the greater part being held by the Keystone Oil and Gas Co., he made them a proposition to develop a part of their holdings if they would turn over 1500 acres to him. The company is said to be favorably disposed to do this, and we are told that the company is now considering the matter. In case the company and Mr. Beam are able to agree upon terms, the coming summer will doubtless see another oil well drilled in this vicinity. Development is what our people want and all will be glad to see any new development that may be made.

CORE DRILLING STOPPED.

Both core drills have been idle the past week or two chiefly on account of cold weather. W. H. Brown who has been core drilling on the Stanley land southeast of town, reached the depth specified in his contract the latter part of December. The showing evidently was not all that the company desired as he has been ordered to drill down seventy-five feet deeper.

York Bros., who have been core drilling southwest of town, completed their second hole and moved to core hole No. 1, drilled by A. G. West & Son, for the purpose of cleaning the hole out and going down to the level of the other holes the Messrs York have drilled. For some cause they were not able to clean this hole out, and are now waiting for orders. The York holes we understand, have shown up well.

The News has always felt that the Keystone Oil and Gas company were on the level in their operations with our people, and their developments noted in these columns from time to time, confirm the opinion we have held. The company seems to be pushing the work here as rapidly as circumstances and magnitude of the undertaking will admit.

COAL BOOM JUST STARTING.

In a letter remitting for The News another year, Mr. James Brann, of Warren, Pa., says that the coal boom here is just starting and that Cainsville is bound to be a busy, thriving city, and he thinks that we will sometime see an oil boom not far away.

Mr. Brann is now at Bartlesville, Okla., where he has considerable oil interests. He made a lengthy stay here while the oil well was being drilled and was chiefly instrumental in securing the large number of leases held by the company, and when it was organized he was one of the largest individual stockholders.
