THE CELESTIAL TRAMP.

Halley's Comet is Beginning to At-
tract Attention Everywhere.

In Leon, as elsewhere, interest
in Halley's great comet is growing
and the coming of the celestial
tramp is looked forward to by many,
who are wondering what he will look
like. The astronomers have given
much attention to this vagrant in
space and know considerable about
him, but they are unable to say what
he will look like when he becomes
visible to the naked eye. He has
appeared as a blood red sign of dis-
aster that hung in the heavens and
was visible during the day time, and
again as a flaming sword, that was
stretched across the blue arch of
heaven at night, and again he has
differed but little from some of the
more brilliant of the planets.

One of those very pleasant people,
who have read much history and
who do not keep their knowledge to
themselves, writes of the last visit
of the universe, and what he beheld
upon earth, as follows in the St.
Louis Globe-Democrat of recent
date:

Far out beyond the orbit of Mars
a visitor is speeding toward us at
the rate of 1,000,000 miles a day. This
is Halley's Comet. In the next seven
or eight months the world will
read and hear much about this call-
er. During part of this time the
world will see him. Long ago the
world also read of him and saw him,
for this will not be his first appear-
ance. He has been here many times,
but at intervals so widely separated
that very few persons are fortunate
enough to be able to greet him
twice. The persons now living who
recall his latest visit must be more
than eighty years of age, for nearly
seventy-five years have elapsed since
he passed this way before.

When in 1682 the British astron-
omer, Edmund Halley, followed
across the firmament as far as his
telescope permitted, the course of
the comet, which blazed in the sky
in that year and aroused the world's
wonder, he thought he detected
some resemblance between it and the
comets which were here in 1607,
1531 and some previous dates. This
led him to assume that the comet of
1682 had a period of seventy-five
or seventy-six years, and therefore
that it would return in 1757 or 1758.
It came to hand in the latter year
and made its appearance once more
in 1835. It travels in a very elongat-
ed ellipse, which carries it out
600,000,000 miles beyond Neptune,
the remotest of the planetary mem-
bers of the sun's family. It will be
near enough to us in January to be
seen with the naked eye and will be
at its brightest in April and May
next.

If our approaching caller could
talk what an interesting story he
would be able to tell us. At his
last visit Andrew Jackson was
president of the United States, Wil-
liam IV ruled in England, the citizen
king, Louis Philippe, was at the front
in France, Nicholas I bore sway in
St. Petersburg, Isabella II ruled
through a regent at Madrid, while
Ferdinand I, who was destined to be
pushed off the throne in 1848 and to
be succeeded by Francis Joseph, was
in power in Vienna. The French
republic, the kingdom of Italy, the
empire of Germany and the empire
of Japan were far in the future. The
western boundary of the United States
stopped at the Sabine and the Rocky
Mountains. If Marco Polo had visited
Asia in that year he would have found
but little change since his time. Africa's
dark continent was as dark as it was
in the days of Mungo Park. Only a
few miles of railroad were laid in
America and Europe. On the ocean
the steamboat was in its experi-
mental stage and was seldom seen.
Telegraph, telephone, electric light
and many other conveniences which
are familiar to us, were as non-
existent then as were the automobile
or the aeroplane. The whole face
of the earth has been transformed
since our coming caller was here be-

fore. And when he swings around
the sun next April and dashes on
toward the end of his outward course
fancy can picture the sights which
will meet him when he passes this
way next time, in 1985?

Sheriff Arrests Mt. Ayr Mayor.

There is a lively tilt on over at
Mt. Ayr between Sheriff H. W. Ter-
rell and Mayor D. B. Marshall, and
bad blood exists, each party having a
following. Last week Mayor Marshall
was arrested on an information
filed by Sheriff Terrell charging him
with using profane language. Mayor
Marshall entered a plea of guilty and
paid his fine, and it is reported that
Sheriff Terrell will invoke the Cos-
son law and try and have Mayor
Marshall ousted from office, using his
plea of guilty in the case before the
justice of the peace for evidence.
The Mt. Ayr Press has the following
account of the incident:

Mayor D. B. Marshall and Sheriff
H. W. Terrell do not live together in
peace and harmony as good brethren
should. Sheriff Terrell had his in-
ning yesterday. Tuesday night some-
body stroked the mayor's fur the
wrong way and he lost control of his
temper and indulged in some profan-
ity. He was in the postoffice at the
time and when Sheriff Terrell heard
of it he filed information before
Justice John H. Taylor. Mayor
Marshall was in Leon on business
yesterday but he was not hard to
apprehend when he returned on the
Des Moines train. Constable D. D.
Beard had the warrant and Mayor
Marshall agreed to come to court at
once. John Taylor heard the case
last night and Mayor Marshall en-
tered a plea of guilty. A fine of
\$8.00 and costs was assessed and
promptly paid.

Mayor Marshall and Sheriff Ter-
rell have not gotten along together
for some time and a few weeks ago
Sheriff Terrell claims to have not-
ified the Mayor that he was after him
for a violation of this ordinance
against swearing. He got him and
got a plea of guilty and now every-
one expects that an attempt will
be made to apply the Cosson law to
remove Mayor Marshall from office.
The editor of the Press tried last
night and this morning to get Mr.
Terrell to tell what he proposed to
do in this respect but could not get
a declaration.

It is a compliment to Mt. Ayr and
Ringgold county when the justices,
mayors and sheriffs have to arrest
each other to get business. It is to
be hoped the public health may get cor-
respondingly good so the physicians
will have to operate on each other to
keep in practice.

The Burlington is experimenting
with the telephone for operating its
trains on the Tracy-Burlington line.
The "power" was turned on the
wires Thursday evening and for the
first time the trains along the Bur-
lington branch were operated by
telephone Friday morning. At present
the line is not working well, but the
trouble will be adjusted at once.
The Burlington expects to put in the
phone service all over the system.
The present experiment will operate
trains between Tracy and Burling-
ton, on what was formerly the Bur-
lington & Western. The Rock
Island is preparing to install tele-
phone service for operation of trains
on the Iowa division. The system
is so arranged that it can be used
either for telephone or telegraphic
service, so that in event one fails the
other can be used.—Knoxville Ex-
press.

One of the new laws as published
by the secretary of state provides
that it shall be unlawful for any
person or persons to place or leave
any broken glass, glass bottles, glass-
ware or glass of any kind in the high-
ways, or in the streets and alleys of
