Sewer Notice.

Of consideration and hearing of a proposed resolution for sewers, sewer outlet and disposal or purifying plant.

Resolution fixing the time and place for the consideration and hearing of a proposed resolution ordering the construction of sewers, sewer outlet and disposal plant and giving notice thereof.

Whereas in order to secure sanitary regulation, health and proper drainage it is deemed advisable and necessary that sewers, a sewer outlet and disposal plant be constructed on the routes and in the locations hereinafter set forth, and as more particularly specified in a proposed resolution therefor now on file in the office of the city clerk of said city, therefore.

Be it resolved by the City Council of the City of Leon, Iowa:

That the 16th day of June, A. D. 1910, at 7:30 o'clock p. m., at the council hall, in said city, be and the same are hereby fixed as the time and place for the consideration of said proposed resolution (which is hereby referred to and made a part hereof) and hearing objections thereto, at which time and place the owners of the property, subject to assessment for the cost of the construction of such sewer, sewer outlet and disposal plant, are hereby notified that they may appear and make objections to the contemplated sewer and the passage of said proposed resolution, and that upon such consideration and hearing of objections, said resolution may be amended and passed or passed as proposed.

That notice of the time and place for the consideration and hearing of objections, as aforesaid, be given by four publications of this resolution and notice in some newspaper of general circulation, published in said city, the last of which publications shall not be less than two nor more than four weeks prior to the time fixed for the consideration and hearing aforesaid.

That location of said sewer are as follows:

Commencing at the west branch of McGruder Creek about seven hundred (700) feet s. e. of center of sec. 33, thence in a northwesterly direction a distance of one hundred (100) feet with a 12 inch vitrified sewer pipe to the septic tank; thence, with a 12 inch pipe, in a northwesterly direction and crossing the west branch of McGruder Creek, a distance of about one hundred twenty-five (125) feet; thence, with a 12 inch pipe, meandering said creek on the south side a distance of about two thousand six hundred and thirty-one (2,631) feet to the intersection of the alley east of Q Street and Thirteenth Street; thence, with a 10 inch pipe west on Thirteenth street to Q street; thence, with a 10 inch pipe north on Q street to 10th street; thence, west with a 10 inch pipe to Idaho street; thence, with a 10 inch pipe north on Idaho street to Ninth street; thence, with an 8 inch pipe north on Idaho street to the flush tank at Seventh street; on Twelfth street with an 8 inch pipe from Q street to Main street; thence, with an 8 inch pipe north on Main street to flush tank at Commercial street; on Commercial street with an 8 inch pipe from Idaho street east to Q street, and with a 6 inch pipe east from Q street to flush tank at Mill street; on Commercial street with an 8 inch pipe west from Idaho street to Main street; thence, with an 8 inch pipe north on Main street to flush tank at Eighth street;

on Eighth street with an 8 inch pipe from Idaho street west to Church street; thence, with an 8 inch pipe north on Church street to Seventh street, and thence north on Church street with a 6 inch pipe to flush tank at Sixth street. From Q street 8 inch pipe to Poplar, 6 inch to Vine, east on 10th street to flush tank on Locust street. From Q street 8 inch pipe east on 11th street to flush tank on Vine street. From Main street on Commercial with 6 inch pipe west to flush tank on Church street.

That the City Engineer, or such person designated to fill that office, of said city be and he is hereby ordered to prepare and file forthwith with the City Clerk of said City, detail plans and specifications for the construction of said sewer and an estimate of the cost thereof.

AUDITOR'S PROCLAMATION OF PRIMARY ELECTION.

Notice is hereby given that a primary election will be held in this county on Tuesday, June 7, 1910. The said primary election will be held in the regular polling places in each election precinct in the county, and the polls will be open at nine o'clock a. m. and close at eight o'clock p. m.

This primary election will be held for the purpose of placing in nomination candidates for the different offices by the different political parties, as shown below. Republican and democrat parties one candidate for each of the following offices: Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Secretary of State, Auditor of State, Treasurer of State, Attorney General, Superintendent of Public Instruction, Clerk of Supreme Court, Reporter of Supreme Court.

For Railroad Commissioner two, for Representative in Congress one, for State Representative one, for Representative in Congress by the Prohibition party one.

OLD LANDMARK DISAPPEARS.

Sigler House, Built by H. C. Sigler in 1858, is Being Removed From Library Lot.

T. H. Swain is tearing down the house on the library lot, known as the old Sigler home, moving it to a lot east of the East Ward school house. The house is one of great historic interest in Osceola. It was built of native lumber in 1858 and at the time was the finest mansion in town. Frank G. Gray sawed the lumber at the old Hogan mill in Doyle township and sold it to Sigler and the oak and walnut are now so hard that the task of tearing it down has been most difficult. The Siglers lived in it many years and sold it to B. F. Fritchett, who lived there until he built the residence across the street, in which Mrs. Fritchett now lives. The owners since have been in succession Mrs. Press Gilbert and James Clark. In the north chimney, which had not been used for some time, was found a squirrel's nest with three very small squirrels in it. The men carefully removed the nest and located it in a tree where the mother followed and so the last occupants of the house are now comfortably located. Thus we mark the passing of another relic of the early days.—Osceola Sentinel.

Cainsville Shaft News.

Again the core drillers have been vindicated. Two or three weeks ago it was reported that the first vein of coal had been uncovered in the main shaft at a depth of 198 feet, approximately, and that another vein would be uncovered at about 250 or 260 feet. The last statement was based on the showing of the log of the core drillers.

Last Saturday night the drills in the main shaft went into this second vein of coal and it was uncovered some time Sunday. This vein is at a depth of 256 feet and is from 14 to 20 inches thick thus proving the correctness of the log which says 18 inches. This coal is also of fine quality and was gathered up and taken home by the people as fast as it was emptied out on the dump.

The main shaft is down this morning approximately 270 feet and fine progress is being made. Another vein of 2 inches was uncovered yesterday and from now on the coal veins will pay no attention to them but go straight down to the big 5 foot vein.

The air shaft is now down about 245 feet, and as in the main shaft good progress is being made. Nearly a full set of hands are now working and everything is now progressing in the most satisfactory manner, and unless some unforeseen accident occurs the Dowells will complete their part of the work from the top to the middle of July.—Cainsville News.
