The Leon Boosters added another victory to their list last Sunday by winning from Davis City, the score being 8 to 0. At no time did Davis City have a chance to win, but on two occasions they had a golden opportunity to score, but on both occasions Wright came to the rescue, and by superb pitching retired the side without a run. In the ninth inning with two men on bases and no one out, the spectators were treated to some classy ball, as the side was retired runless, two going out on strikes. As usual the visitors were helpless before such pitching, fifteen fanning the air, and only four being able to connect for safe hits. King was on the mound for the visitors and was touched up for eleven hits, two of which were for extra bases. Six Leon batters fell by the strike-out route.

The boosters are playing exceptionally fast ball this year, the team average for eight games being .311 batting and .912 fielding.
