Frank Wagoner and Susie Davis Abscond.

Twin Female Calves.

A Plymouth county, Iowa, subscriber writes: "What are the facts regarding the barrenness of twin calves? I have a cow that had twin heifer calves and do not care to raise them if they are likely to be barren." Three kinds of twin calves are possible: Two females and both normal; one female and one male, and both normal; and two males, in which case one partakes of both male and female and is known as a "free-martin." A free-martin is always barren. Whether the female is always fertile in cases where the twins are of different sexes and both appear to be normal upon close inspection, we are unable to say, but sometimes she is. The males seems always to be as able to beget as other males. When both twins are females, both are fertile. The cause of free-martins, which have external female organs, including rudimentary female ducts and internal male organs, has never been learned.—Farmer's Tribune.

Infantile Paralysis in Iowa.

Something like an epidemic of infantile paralysis is in progress at Mason City where between twenty-five and thirty children are afflicted with that terrible disease. Fears are expressed that it may spread across the state and become general. It rarely attacks children above the age of five but cases are known where even adults have not been immune. The disease is pronounced transmissible by no less authority than Dr. Anderson, head of the United States laboratory of public health and hygiene, who asserts that it is both infectious and contagious, being conveyed through the agency of the salivary glands and the nasal membranes.

This is a very serious matter. It needs the most active investigation by the health authorities of the state, not by students and those not thoroughly qualified, but by the most competent and highly trained specialists. No doubt the general danger is accentuated by fear but it is evident that a very serious condition exists which may very easily become appalling.

There should be immediate and decisive action to prevent contagion. Infantile paralysis seems to be in a class with cerebro spinal meningitis and diphtheria. Neither pains nor expense should be considered and delay would be a crime.

If, as Dr. Anderson has concluded, this disease is transmitted by a salivary vehicle and acquired through the nasal passages, the public drinking cup, and the dirty, dusty streets have become even more eminently dangerous. The ice cream cone which goes from mouth to mouth among a half dozen children and the thousand ways children have of conveying salivary infection from lip to lip have become deadly processes. It is up to the mothers as well as the doctors.

But let the health department get busy at once; and above all things render back to that department the authority it needs to be effective and without which it can not be fully effective.—Marshalltown Times-Republican.


