Washington Letter.

Washington, Oct. 22.—More than 175 American manufacturers whose products are protected in this country by the Payne-Aldrich bill are selling their goods cheaper abroad than at home.

The best evidence that American consumers are being charged excessively is the secrecy with which the tariff beneficiaries make lower prices to foreigners.

The beef trust heads the list. It is shipping American beef to England and after paying transportation across the Atlantic, sells its products at two cents a pound below American market price.

The following table compiled from discount sheets sent to Europe by American firms, shows the difference between export and home prices of certain specified articles.

Auger bits—Irwin's solid center, 4-16, per dozen, export price, \$1.50; home price, \$1.80.

Belts—Carriage, 3/4x3 inches, per hundred, export price, 60 cents; home price, 75 cents. Machine, 3/4x4 inches, per hundred, export price, 57 cents; home price, 68 cents. Tire, 3/4x3 inches, per hundred, export price, 65 cents; home price, 76 cents.

Braces—Fray's ratchet No. 81, per dozen, export price, \$10.64; home price, \$14.50.

Harness snaps—"Trojan" 1 1/2 loop, per gross, export price, \$2.70; home price, \$3.60.

Lamp chimneys—Macbeth No. 502, per dozen, export price 40 cents; home price 68 cents. Macbeth's No. 504 per dozen, export price, 50 cents, home price, 82 cents.

Rifles—Steven's "Little Scout," No. 14, each, export price, \$1.35; home price, \$1.75. Steven's "Favorite" each, export price, \$3.47; home price, \$4.50.

Watches—Elgin movement, 20 year gold filled case, export price, \$7.98; home price, \$10.23. Elgin movement, silveroid case, export price, \$3.04; home price \$4.47.

It is true, of course, that low prices to consumers in England increases the sale of American goods. Lower domestic prices on the same goods would also increase the sale in America, thereby increasing the

output and the employment of labor, and tending to increase the wages of the workers. An illustration of this view appears in the experience of the steel trust. Notwithstanding the panic of 1907 in the United States, it made great public announcement a sweeping reduction in prices.

The result was a prompt and very marked revival of activity in the domestic sales of iron and steel products, leading to the planning and building of many new bridges, buildings and other structures and the renewal of operations in many industries requiring iron and steel.

If American manufacturers of lead, oil, chemicals, hardware, harvesting machinery, watches, typewriters, typesetting machines, would give Americans the same prices extended to foreigners, there is no reason why their markets would not be vastly enlarged, as were those of the steel trust. The American people constitute the greatest purchasing possibilities in the world.

Experience with American trusts, however, justifies the view of downward revision unless that the manufacturers in the United States will not reduce their domestic prices to anywhere near the level of the prices extended to foreigners until they are forced to do so by real downward revision of the tariff.

Going Up. Prices are still going up. As a result of the upward revision of the entire cotton schedule in the Payne-Aldrich law, the prices of woman's and children's dress goods have increased considerably.

The John V. Farwell Company says in a review of the wholesale dry goods trade that still more advances may be expected.

The review declares that "almost all manufacturing agents are advancing prices on manufactured cottons. As it looks now prices will continue to grow firmer and higher in staple cotton goods."

Tuberculosis a House Disease. Home Sanitation Important. Fresh Air Prevention.

(By A. E. Kepford, Lecturer.)

Des Moines, Oct. 15th.—Now that winter is coming on, there will be a disposition on the part of a great many people to prepare for its advance by making their house airtight. They will do this for the purpose of making the house comfortable and to insure the health of the inmates against colds and disease believed to be incident to winter. They will bank the house around with manure or dirt and put storm windows on, together with storm doors, to if possible keep out the cold air.

The precautions, however, are directly opposed to sanitation and good health. Instead of preventing colds and disease of the respiratory tract, they but contribute to them. Tuberculosis is a house disease. The very fact that patients are taken into the open air for treatment, is suggestive that the open air should be freely admitted into the dwelling. This is especially true with reference to the sleeping rooms. The open sleeping apartment should be provided. No bedroom but that should have an abundance of air admitted to it whenever occupied.

A thorough renovation of the house from basement to garret should be made, with such disinfection as may be available in making the house healthful. The ventilation of bedrooms should be constant, as it requires a vast amount of fresh air each hour for an adult, 3,500 cubic feet. It requires 3,000 cubic feet each hour for a youth and about 2,500 cubic feet each hour for a little child.

In this connection, it might be well to state that the proper care of the body, such as frequent bathing and nutritious diet are essential, especially with growing children.

The hygiene environment of the home is of first consideration in the prevention of all kinds of disease, especially of the respiratory tract. In the combat against tuberculosis the most potential factor is the fresh air. Of course, people should be arranged should be made for the

kept warm while sleeping, and ample proper protection of the body, but it is desirable to utter this note of warning, that as winter approaches, the people should not relax their sleeping in the open air, but should rather prepare to continue this throughout the winter.
