

LOSES ARM IN SHREDDER.

M. L. Brittain Has Left Arm Crushed in Shredder and Amputation Follows.

M. L. Brittain, a former resident of Franklin township met with a painful accident at Humeston recently which necessitated the amputation of his left arm. The Humeston Era has the following account of the accident:

M. L. Brittain of this place had the misfortune Saturday to get an arm cut off in a corn shredder. Mr. Brittain was working with the machine when he accidentally got his left arm caught in the corn huskers. The arm was badly crushed and mangled between the wrist and elbow that it was necessary to amputate it about an inch and a half below the elbow.

The accident happened about 10:30 Saturday morning at the W. F. Rouse home in the southeast part of town where the machine, owned by Ed Rutledge, was working. Mr. Brittain was taken to his home in the west part of town where the badly mangled member was amputated and dressed by Drs. McCullough & Smith.

The injury, which is a most painful one, is one of the most dreadful accidents that has ever occurred here.

Mr. Brittain is a laborer, about fifty-five years of age, and has quite a large family depending upon him. Saturday Rev. Roberts raised a purse of \$75 for the family.

Mr. Brittain's condition today is as good as could be expected.

A Mathematica Trick.
