Mrs. Rebecca S. Conkle.

Rebecca S. Stewart was born in West Virginia, Sept. 3, 1824, and died at her home in Leon, Iowa, Nov. 13, 1910, at the age of 86 years, 2 months and 10 days.

On April 6th, 1884 she was united in marriage to Wm. P. Conkle and in 1868 they came to Iowa and settled on a farm two miles east of Leon, where they resided until Mr. Conkle's death on Oct. 13, 1886. A short time after this Mrs. Conkle moved to Leon where she resided to the time of her death. There were no children born to them and the only relative present at her funeral was a nephew, Mr. Albert A. Anderson, of Des Moines.

Mrs. Conkle had been in feeble health for several years, and a few weeks ago received injuries by falling when a small fire occurred at her home which hastened her death. She was a member of the Leon M. E. church, but on account of ill health had been unable to attend church services for some years. Funeral services were conducted from her late residence at 10 o'clock Tuesday morning, conducted by Rev. E. M. Hoff, pastor of the Leon M. E. church, interment being in the Leon cemetery.

Death of Dorr Heffelman.

The following account of the death of Mr. Dorr Heffelman, is taken from the San Diego, California, Daily Union of Nov. 3rd. Many years ago Mr. Heffelman was a resident of Iowa, and in a letter from his son, Paul Heffelman, we are requested to add to the notice that all persons bearing the name of Heffelman, or who are related to the Heffelmans, or the Cavally, Eales or Fenner families, are requested to write to Paul Heffelman, 3370 B Street, San Diego, Calif., and learn something to their advantage.

Dorr Heffelman, aged 72 years, a retired banker and business man, died yesterday at the home of his daughter and son-in-law. Mr. and Mrs. Leroy A. Wright, 3370 B street. Mr. Heffelman had been ill for several months with kidney complaint complicated by heart trouble, but not until recently did his condition become serious.

The decedent was a great grandson of Dr. Arnold Hoevelmann, a native of Prussia, who came to America with General Lafayette, in whose army he served as a surgeon during the Revolutionary war, afterwards settling in Pottsgrove, near Philadelphia. Arnold Hoevelmann's descendants, when they emigrated to the west, principally to Ohio and Iowa, changed the spelling of the name.

Dorr Heffelman was born in Iowa, and in his young manhood engaged in the banking business in that state, continuing in the same line of business for a quarter of a century in Nebraska.

He leaves a wife, Sarah E. Heffelman, a daughter, Mrs. Leroy A. Wright, and a son, Paul Heffelman. Senator Wright, his son-in-law, had been called east by urgent legal business only the night before Mr. Heffelman's death, taking the train Tuesday night, and it was after his departure that Mr. Heffelman seemed to sink rapidly, death occurring yesterday morning.

The funeral will be private, as Mrs. Heffelman is nearly prostrated by her long vigil at his bedside.
