

Robert Kelley died on Sunday,
November 20, at the home of his
son, C. W., at Kelley, in Sioux coun-
ty, aged 65 years, 10 months and 20
days. Funeral exercises were held

tery that afternoon, Rev. Jas. G.
Clark conducting the services.

Deceased is survived by wife and

Hanna at Nevada, Mo.

Mr. Kelley had been a life-long
