

November Weather.

Here is what Hicks, the St. Louis weather prognosticator says about the weather for the balance of this month: A reactionary storm period falling on the 6th 7th and 8th, with new moon on the 8th, threatening weather will continue over from the 5th, bringing a return of falling barometer, change to warmer and increasing storms of rain and wind on and touching the 8th and 9th. These storms will end in dashes of curly snow and change to very much colder, about the 9th, 10th and 11th. From the 5th to the 11th, central on the 8th, general seismic unrest will be very natural and probable. A regular storm period involves the 11th to the 15th, being central on the 13th. At this period the moon will be at extreme south declination and atmospheric tides will flow from northerly directions, increasing the probability of cold rains and winds, added to snow and sleet over central to northern parts of the country. The mercury and Venus periods will both be felt in the disturbances of this period, and to the end of the month. Storms of this period will culminate on the 13th, 14th, 15th and 16th—first to the west and thence progressively, day by day, to the eastward. High barometer and change to westerly winds and colder will push the western flanks of the storm center, all the way to the Atlantic. One of the most important things to know, and keep in mind, is that rising temperature, falling barometer and fair weather precedes storms, and rising barometer and colder, clearing weather will follow storms.

A reactionary storm period falls on and touching the 18th, 19th and 20th. There will be electrical storms centering on and touching the 19th, the date of the moon's crossing the celestial equator. Under strain of both Mercury and Venus periods decided storms culminating in snow and sleet, may be expected at this period. A general low barometer at this time will be ample warning of dangerous autumnal gales, especially on the Atlantic and over the lake regions. A regular storm period involves the 23rd to 28th. Watch your barometer. This period calls for violent autumnal storms. Rain, sleet and snow, fierce gales and a sweeping cold wave following will be the order. The Venus period which begins about the middle of November will intensify and aggravate storm conditions all the last half of November, but the culmination of the period will fall in December.

New Railroad Prospects. Cainsville people were thrown into a fever of excitement Sunday evening by the arrival of a corps of surveyors from St. Joseph under the command of Mr. J. W. Brockett of that city, who upon inquiry said that they were surveying a route from Cainsville to St. Joseph via Mt. Moriah, Bethany and Pattonsburg. They began work Monday morning and at the time of going to press are between Mt. Moriah and Bethany. They began at the end of Enterprise street in this city near the mine and followed very nearly the old survey between here and Mt. Moriah. There are many rumors afloat as to what company they represent, but The News like other people is "up in the air" about the matter. They may represent the Burlington, and they may represent some other company or it may be that Mr. Brockett is promoting a road to St. Joseph in the same manner as Mr. Morck has been promoting one to Trenton and Chillicothe. All we know for certain is that the surveyors were here and are at work on the line indicated. Mr. Brockett is a successful railroad man, one of his notable achievements being the promotion of the Q. O. & K. C., from Kansas City to Quincy, Ill. Nothing was said, so far as we know, about right-of-way but that may come later. Cainsville needs a southern route and if this is the move that will let us out of the wilderness, we're for it.—Cainsville News.


