

WILSON CHOSEN PRESIDENT BY GREAT VOTE

Democratic Nominee Sweeps the Country From the Atlantic to the Pacific.

G. O. P. STRONGHOLDS FALL

New York, Massachusetts, Ohio and Other States Fall Into Democratic Column.

Woodrow Wilson is elected president. He has carried New York, New Jersey, Indiana, Minnesota, Massachusetts, Maryland, West Virginia, Delaware, Missouri and the solid south and has already 302 votes in the electoral college based on the

early scattering returns. There seems not the slightest chance that the later returns will change the complexion of the result. If anything, it is probable that Wilson's total electoral vote will be increased.

IOWA.

Des Moines—Thirty-one precincts in city of Des Moines gave Taft 2,303, Wilson 3,583, Roosevelt 3,967. For Governor, Clarke 4,253, Dunn 2,584, Stevens 1,928.

Early returns indicated that Taft polled only about forty per cent of the vote of four years ago, while the Wilson vote is about eighty per cent of Bryan's vote of the same year. Roosevelt was running about even with Wilson.

Seven precincts from Marion, Pottawattamie, Carroll, Lyons and Buena Vista counties give returns: Taft 290, Wilson 450, Roosevelt 471. Four years ago Taft had 728, with Bryan 541.

Des Moines—Twenty-five widely scattered precincts over the state give Taft 1,368, Wilson 1,591, Roosevelt 2,161. The vote in 1908 was Taft 3,536, Bryan 1,902.

Des Moines—Three hundred and eighty-five precincts outside of Polk county give Taft 20,117, Wilson 31,762, Roosevelt 34,734. These same precincts in 1908 gave Taft 49,984, Bryan 36,059.

Burlington—Eleven precincts out of 27 in Des Moines county, including the city of Burlington, give Roosevelt 1,263, Taft, 1219, Wilson 1,553. Rock Rapids—Lyon county, Taft 3, Wilson 38, Roosevelt 75.

Des Moines—Thirty-seven precincts over Iowa give Taft 2,022, Wilson 2,560, Roosevelt 3,023. The vote in 1908 in the same precincts was, Taft, 5,175, Bryan 3,256.

Ottumwa—Six precincts out of 27 in Wapello county gave Taft 557, Wilson 624, Roosevelt 401. Three precincts gave Clarke 235, Dunn 305.

Des Moines—Complete returns from 56 precincts gave Taft 8,167, Wilson 3,628, Roosevelt 4,752. The vote in 1908 in the same precincts, Taft 7,909 Bryan 4,836.

Des Moines—One hundred and thirty-one precincts outside of Polk county give Taft 6,922, Wilson 9,315, Roosevelt 11,930.

Des Moines—One hundred and five precincts over Iowa outside of Polk county gave Taft 5,668, Wilson 7,150, Roosevelt 9,357. The votes in these 105 precincts is over 1,800 heavier than last presidential year.

Des Moines—One hundred seventy-five Iowa precincts outside of Polk county give Taft 5,596, Wilson 13,981

Roosevelt 16,117. Same precincts in 1908 gave Taft 25,479, Bryan 16,157. Roosevelt's lead over Wilson continues to range from 2,500 to 2,700.

Burlington—The city of Burlington complete gives Wilson 2,251; Taft, 1,334; Roosevelt, 1,388. Congressman, Elder (dem.), 2,096; Kennedy (rep.), 1,860, Crail (prog.) 1,034, Governor, Dunn (dem.), 2,229; Clarke (rep.), 1,674; Stevens (prog.), 1,064.

Sioux City—Three precincts out of thirteen in Sioux City give Wilson a lead of 100 over Roosevelt.

Three hundred precincts outside of Polk county give Taft 18,091, Wilson 28,076, Roosevelt 31,745.

Des Moines—Outside of Polk county, returns from 89 Iowa precincts gave Taft 4,646, Wilson 5,866 Roosevelt 7,733. Vote same precincts 1908 Taft 12,232, Bryan 7,072.

Des Moines—Two hundred and twenty-five precincts outside of Polk county give Taft 11,926, Roosevelt 20,645, Wilson 18,182.

Two hundred and seventy-four precincts outside of Polk county give Taft 14,526, Wilson 22,271, Roosevelt 25,139.

NEW YORK.

New York, Nov. 5.—Twenty election districts out of the 924 in Manhattan and the Bronx give Wilson 2,174, Taft 955 and Roosevelt 1,045.

Twenty election districts out of the 162 in Brooklyn give Wilson 2,762, Taft 1,170 and Roosevelt 1,427.

Returns from fifty-six election districts out of 3,093 in New York state outside of New York City give Taft 8,411, Wilson 9,225 and Roosevelt 5,170. In 1908 Taft got 14,496 and Brown 12,017.

Sixty election districts out of 612 in Brooklyn give Wilson 9,312, Taft 3,856, and Roosevelt 4,935.

Returns for governor from twenty-nine election districts out of 3,093 in New York state outside of New York City give Hedges (rep.), 4,246 Sulzer (dem.), 4,841, Straus (pro.) 2,435. The same districts in 1908 gave Stimson (rep.), 5,584 and Dix (dem.) 5,550.

Complete returns from Rochester gives Wilson a majority of about 900.

Ten election districts out of the 149 in the Borough of Queens gives Wilson 1,732, Taft 537 and Roosevelt 696.

One hundred and thirty election districts out of 1,730 in the city of New York give Wilson 21,017, Taft 8,174 and Roosevelt 10,268.

Jamestown complete gives Wilson 846, Taft 2,010 and Roosevelt 2,255 Sulzer 913, Hedges 2,166 and Straus 2,304.

Returns from 272 election districts out of 3,093 in New York state outside of New York City give Taft 35,557, Wilson 45,567 and Roosevelt 33,563. In 1908 Taft received 78,922 and Bryan 61,725.

Utica, New York.—Utica complete for president gives Wilson 5,380, Taft 4,851 and Roosevelt 3,205.

New York—Returns from seven election districts out of 3,093 in New York state outside of New York City give Taft 2,626, Wilson 2,792, Roosevelt 1,490. The same districts in 1908 gave Taft 4,918 and Bryan 3,818.

Rochester, New York.—Fifty-four districts out of ninety-six in the city give Wilson 7,282, Taft 6,967 and Roosevelt, 5,760.

New York.—Four hundred and thirty election districts out of the 1,730 in the city of New York give Wilson 73,520, Taft 28,282 and Roosevelt 37,657.

ILLINOIS.

Chicago—Three hundred and forty-nine of 1,364 precincts in Chicago give Roosevelt 34,317, Wilson 30,739, Taft 18,090, Debs 13,054.

One hundred ninety-two precincts out of 1,498 in Cook county for Governor, Dunn (dem.), 21,958; Deneen (rep) 12,165, Funk (prog) 11,039.

Three hundred seventy-nine precincts out of 1,364 in Chicago give Roosevelt 37,798, Wilson 33,466, Taft 19,771 Debs, 14,089.

One hundred forty-five precincts out of 1,498 in Cook county, for state attorney, Hoynes (dem) 11,566, Cuneo (soc), 10,584, Rynaker (rep), 9,634, Haight (prog), 6,915.



CLARK WINNER OF GOVERNORSHIP

Leads Taft Everywhere and Entire Republican State Ticket is Elected.

Des Moines, Nov. 6.—George W. Clarke of Adel will be the next governor of Iowa, according to reports received up to an early hour this morning. His indicated plurality will run from 20,000 to 35,000 votes over E. G. Dunn, the democratic candidate, and he will undoubtedly carry the

whole republican ticket to victory with him. The reports are mostly estimates made from incomplete returns by county leaders over the state. The vote for Stevens, the progressive candidate, fell far short of the Roosevelt vote in every precinct heard from, and the Clarke vote showed everywhere a remarkable increase over the vote for Taft.

MASSACHUSETTS.

Boston, Mass., Nov. 6.—Returns for president in Tuesday's election from 20 out of 1,102 precincts in Massachusetts give Roosevelt 1,479, Taft 2,600, Wilson 1,479. Same precincts in 1908 gave Bryan (dem.) 1,151, Taft (rep) 3,775.

Returns for president and governor from 10 out of 221 voting precincts in Boston in today's election give for president—Roosevelt, (prog) 863, Taft 767, Wilson (dem) 1,634. For governor—Bird (prog.) 741, Foss (dem) 1,713, Walker (rep.) 754.

Boston, Nov. 5.—Returns for president from 90 out of 1,102 voting precincts in Massachusetts, including 60 out of 221 precincts in Boston, give Roosevelt 7,339, Taft 8,326, Wilson 11,494. The same precincts in 1908 gave Bryan 11,898, Taft 15,424.

Boston, Nov. 5.—Taft carried Acushnet, the first town in the United States heard from today.

The vote was Roosevelt, 50, Taft, 104, Wilson 52. In 1908 Acushnet gave Bryan 12, Taft 118.

Norwell voted as follows: Roosevelt, 104, Taft, 97, Wilson, 78. In 1908 Bryan, 40, Taft 164.

Boston—Gov. Wilson's strength in Boston almost equalled that of Col. Roosevelt and President Taft combined, the two latter almost evenly dividing the vote received by Taft four years ago. The democratic nominee made a slight gain over the vote given Bryan in 1908. Complete returns from the city gave Roosevelt 22,755, Taft 21,875, Wilson 47,361.

Three hundred sixty-five out of 1,102 precincts in Massachusetts, including all except five in Boston give Wilson 51,984, Taft 34,480, Roosevelt 31,839.

MARYLAND.

Baltimore, Nov. 6.—First returns from Baltimore coming from two widely separated precincts give Taft 74, Wilson 305, Roosevelt 157.

Same in 1908, Taft 341, Bryan 264. Voting machines were used for the first time in this city, but in no other precincts in the state.

Baltimore, Maryland—The Democrats claim Maryland for Wilson by 40,000.

SEN. KENYON WILL RETAIN HIS SEAT

Republicans of Iowa Apparently Have Captured Majority New Legislature.

Des Moines, Nov. 6.—With a number of legislative districts still in doubt and waiting for complete returns to name the winner, it appears early today that the republicans will control the Thirty-fifth general assembly on joint ballot and re-elect United States Senator Wm. S. Kenyon.

Compiled from early reports the figures are as follows: Senate, republican 19, democrat 5, and doubtful 5. House, republican 53, democrats 27, and doubtful 18. There are twenty-one holdover senators and the republicans have eleven of these. The composition of the joint assembly from these returns shows 83 republicans, 52 democrats and 23 doubtful. As there are 158 members in the legislature Senator Kenyon will have one vote more than is needed, if all the doubtful districts are against the republican candidate.

ROOSEVELT SAYS CAUSE WILL PROSPER

Declares Fate of Leader of the Progressive Movement of Little Consequence.

CONGRATULATES WILSON

Says He Accepts Result of Election With Entire Good Humor.

Oyster Bay.—Shortly before midnight Col. Roosevelt made the following statement:

"The American people by a great plurality have decided in favor of Mr. Wilson and the democratic party. Like all good citizens, I accept the result with entire good humor. For the progressive cause I can only repeat what I have already said. 'The fate of the leader is of little consequence, the cause will prosper.'"

At the same time he issued his statement, Col. Roosevelt sent the following telegram to Governor Wilson:

"By a great plurality the people have conferred upon you the highest honor in their gift. I congratulate you thereon."

DIXON CONCEDES WEST TO WILSON.

New York.—Sen. Dixon, Roosevelt's manager, concedes all western states to Wilson.

George M. Palmer, chairman of the democratic state committee authorized the statement to the effect that doubtless the state of New York had given Wilson 250,000 plurality.

BARNES GIVES UP NEW YORK.

New York.—Chairman William Barnes, Jr., of the republican state committee on Tuesday night made the statement that Governor Wilson will carry New York state by a plurality of between 100,000 and 150,000.

Early returns from New York City and state point almost unerringly to victory for Governor Wilson, with the race for second place apparently close between President Taft and Colonel Roosevelt. Buffalo has been carried by Wilson, who has a lead of 11,000 votes over Taft.

National Chairman McCombs of the democratic national committee Tuesday evening said the New York upstate returns exceeded their expectations and that the entire state would give Wilson a vote greater than the combined vote of Taft and Roosevelt.

COLORADO FOR WILSON.

Will Have 40,000 Over Taft, Who Leads Roosevelt.

Denver.—On the basis of reports received from 101 precincts in Colorado, including 27 in Denver, figured on an estimated total of 270,000 votes, Colorado should give Wilson 120,000, Taft 78,000, Roosevelt 75,000.
