After all the efforts to climb the highest point in Northern America it is a missionary archdeacon who first goes to the top of Mount McKinley. The Rev. Hudson Stuck, R. G. Tatum, also a missionary, and a couple of Alaskans have been at the task since March. They erected a six-foot cross on the summit, which is more sensible than Dr. Cook's brass tube, as it can be seen from some distance with a telescope or found by later climbers. Mount McKinley is perhaps 20,300 feet high. The limit at which men can sustain in rarefied air the labor of mountain climbing is fixed for the present, at about 24,000 feet. McKinley's northeastern ridge, up which Dr. Cook stalled while his companions were elsewhere engaged, took the Stuck party three weeks to "hew" a passage. Clergymen have often had excellent mountain climbing. They are commonly temperate, they have long summer vacations and the high Alps are good for "ministerial sore throat." In ascribing "chief credit" to the "good judgment, resourcefulness and caution" of Kasterns, the guide, Dr. Stuck gives evidence of another good quality of the genuine "athletic Christianity."


