**CELERY SALAD.** Cut the celery up into inch pieces and split each one; rub dry in a towel and set on ice; prepare a small cup of English walnut meats and two heaping tablespoons of chopped olives, with a cup of stiff mayonnaise. Just before serving mix all together, put into a salad bowl, with celery leaves around the edge, do not use lettuce. Be careful not to put the mayonnaise on the celery till the last moment, and have the mayonnaise very thick.
