If there are any such points of danger on the grounds of your neighbors, urge them to clean up, and if your urging does not produce the desired results, call up the health department.

Filth breeds flies—not in the old spontaneous generation sense, but practically. Flies breed disease, especially typhoid, infantile paralysis, and the various intestinal disorders which kill so many thousands of babies every warm season. The best way to save babies is to wipe out the breeding places and food supplies of flies before the winged pests arrive.
