

PENSIONS FOR TEACHERS.
The Law is in Effect in State of Illinois.
To the present the efforts of the Iowa teachers to have a pension system established for the benefit of those who have been worn out in the public service, have been barren of results. For some unaccountable reason, the lawmakers at Des Moines have killed several bills which had been prepared by the teachers and were being given fairly strong backing. Of course the Iowa teachers will persevere and eventually they will get what they want and really need. In this connection the following from a Rock Island paper regarding the teachers' pension law in Illinois, ought to prove of interest to many:
Teachers who are beginning their career as instructors in the public schools of Illinois, will find their pay checks \$1 short each month for the next five months because of the contribution they are required to make to the Illinois state teachers' pension and retirement fund. All new teachers are compelled by law to pay the monthly assessments while the older instructors have until 1920 to determine whether they wish to become participants in the pension act.
Teachers who have taught less than ten years will be required to pay \$1 each month for the first five months of school, and those who have taught more than ten years and less than 15 years will be taxed \$2 each month for the first five months. Instructors who have taught more than 15 years pay \$3 each month for the first five months, and in each of the three classes the money is deducted by the school directors and forwarded to the state treasurer before the middle of July of the year after the money is received.
All assessments cease after a teacher has been in service 25 years and then it is possible for the instructors who get the benefit of the pension to retire and receive an income of \$400 annually. Each teacher will be furnished with a statement by the school board showing the amount deducted monthly from his salary. The name of the teacher who pays assessments must be promptly reported to the county superintendent at the time the assessment is withheld.
No teacher can receive this pension unless the equivalent of \$400 and interest for twenty-five years has been paid. For those teachers
