### County Road Sign Boards.

The county supervisors are considering the propriety of placing suitable guide boards at convenient corners on the new county highway system, giving direction and distance to the several towns. Other counties in Iowa are commencing to do this, and while the law has authorized it for several years this state has been known as one of the hardest places in the Union to find directions in. Other states maintain good guide boards, but Iowa has spent most of its money for roads and bridges and less in advising as to the best routes.—Sutherland Courier. The law requires township trustees to put up sign boards at all important intersections, but none of them do it. If they will not the supervisors should, and we are pleased to hear the Tama county supervisors talk of supplying the neglect.—Traer Star-Clipper.
