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Mrs. Preston C. Hampton.

Sarah H. Ockerman was born on April 18, 1843, in Decatur county, Indiana, near Greensburg. Moving from there with her parents at the age of twelve to Decatur county, Iowa, near Leon. October 5, 1865, she was married to Preston C. Hampton, who preceded her to the next world on Nov. 7, 1913. To this union there were born 5 children, one of whom died in infancy, and one in the early years of his life.

She leaves to mourn her loss three children, Joseph P. Hampton, Mrs. Elsie J. Whan and Mrs. Della B. Smith, together with thirteen grandchildren.

She departed this life Nov. 20, 1916, at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Elsie J. Whan, in Lineville, where kindly hands ministered to the comfort of "Grandma" unto the end of her life. She was at the time of her death, aged 73 years, 7 months and 2 days. "Grandma" had not been well. She gradually grew worse during the late summer and toward the end her suffering was very severe, but withal, was borne with rare patience and fortitude. She enjoyed the society of those who came to visit with her and was remarkably cheerful for one in her condition.

She has been a member of the Methodist Episcopal church South, of long standing, and although being unable to attend the services of the church for some time she did not lack interest. At the end she was ready and fully prepared to die, just passing to the other world to meet her Lord, who she shall miss her as mother, grandmother, neighbor and church member. "Blessed are the dead which die in the Lord from henceforth: Yea, saith the Spirit, that they may rest from their labors."

L. L. Richardson.

Lewis L. Richardson was the oldest of four children, and was born at Keosauqua, Iowa, September 24, 1848. He departed this life at his home in Leon, Iowa, November 29, 1916.

Mr. Richardson came to Decatur county with his parents in 1854, and has resided here ever since.

On September 18, 1891, Mr. Richardson was united in marriage to Miss Marcella L. Lockwood. Two children were born to this union, Harriett Jane and Lewis Leland, both of whom with their mother mourn the departure of one who was dearest to them among the children of men.

Mr. Richardson was an honorable and upright man. He was honest in all of his dealings and was respected and esteemed by all who knew him. One brother, G. G. Richardson, of Sayre, Okla., and two sisters, Mrs. Emma Beavers of Woodland, Iowa, and Mrs. Ella Biddison of Leon, Iowa, also a large circle of friends and acquaintances join the bereaved family in mourning the departure of a good citizen and of a man who sought to live upright before his generation.

The funeral services were held from 10 to 11 o'clock, Thursday afternoon, November 30, Rev. Raoul R. Moser, of the Methodist church, conducting the same. A quartette from Woodland provided the music. The burial took place in Leon's cemetery.

Cattle Die From Eating Corn Stalks.

Quite a number of cases of farmers losing cattle by founder and impaction of the stomach after turning them into a stalk field were reported in this vicinity last week, the most serious of which was that of Wayne Lovett, west of town who lost three valuable cows and his registered 3-year-old Hereford bull, J. S. Craney also lost three spring calves from the same trouble which was pronounced by Dr. Jones of Clio, who was called, as impaction of the stomach, caused by filling up on dry fodder and failure to get to water in time. There is always danger in turning a cow into fresh stalk pasture, but this season more than usual because of the shortage of other pastures, making the stock more greedy when turned into the stalk fields. The veterinarians say that the only safety is in leaving them in the stalk pastures but an hour or two at a time at first until they become accustomed to the change of feed, in the meantime giving them plenty of salt and water.—Lineville Tribune.

Lamoni Girl Honored.

Miss Pearl Jones of Chicago, Ill., a former Lamoni girl, made her friends proud by the work she did in the late presidential campaign. She was assistant manager of the foreign bureau in Chicago and she entered into the work with her usual spirit, winning the place of a guest of honor at a banquet given to Senator Walsh, Senator Buckley giving a toast to her to which she was cheered until she responded with a speech. She was presented with a purse and some German spoons in appreciation of her services—and was one of the committee appointed to escort Senator Walsh to the depot on his departure for the west. She received additional honors at Italian, Polish, Bohemian and Lithuanian gatherings. Thus the Lamoni girl enters into the political arena and as elsewhere holds her own. Miss Jones is the daughter of the late Daniel Jones and Mrs. Fannie Jones, and with her widowed mother keenly enjoyed the privileges of equal suffrage accorded to the women of Illinois.

Geo. Klinehan Killed.

We learn of the death of Geo. Klinehan, of Albia, Wednesday of last week in a railroad accident. Mr. Klinehan married a former Garden Grove girl, Daisy Chenoweth and the two were here early in the fall with their two children visiting relatives. Mr. Klinehan was an extra conductor but at the time of the accident was braking and making up a train at Albia. Something was wrong with one of the couplers and he stepped in between the cars to remedy the difficulty when the engineer gave the train a severe bump and the coupler caught him in the stomach and back piercing him through the body. He lived a few hours after the accident in a terrible agony. The funeral services were held the last of the week and were attended by relatives of the family here.—Garden Grove Express.


