Iowa Boys' and Girls' Club Work. Exhibits in this division will be displayed in Boys' and Girls' Club Building.

Canning demonstrations, manual training and other demonstration work will be conducted each day at the Club Building.

Any Iowa boy or girl between the ages of ten and eighteen, inclusive, may exhibit in this class. Those desiring to exhibit should write immediately for reservation of space. The individual or the club is the exhibitor.

Class No. 7—Individual Exhibit by Any Club Member.

Amount offered in this class \$55. 701—Best exhibit of club work, by any member of Iowa Boys' and Girls' Club; exhibit to consist of written account in booklet form, telling of experience of club member in and samples of any work or products which the member may be able to exhibit.

Products canned in tin may be included in collective exhibit if desired. The "4 H Brand" label should be used.

Exhibitors desiring to have their exhibits sold rather than returned at the close of the Fair, may indicate the minimum price, and the Superintendent of the Department will do his best to find a buyer. A low wholesale market price should be quoted if sale is expected. In case no sale is made, exhibits will be returned to exhibitor, charges collect.

From time to time it has been reported that German agents here have been guilty of the hideous and cowardly methods credited to them, and that this country must guard itself against every menace that conscienceless fiendishness can devise. In this connection, readers will probably remember the charges of a year ago against German agents in Roumania, and the accounts of a plot discovered for wholesale infection of the Roumanian people and herds. They may recollect also that more recently French has accused the Teutons of deliberate infection of prisoners so that they might become disease-carriers when they returned to their own countries under exchange or because they were no longer possible military factors. It was difficult to credit these accounts well authenticated and soberly sponsored though some of them were, but the government's recognition of the court plaster episode gives them a new force. No one should buy plasters from a peddler.
