

BOARD PROCEEDINGS

Proceedings of Board of Supervisors at the May Session, 1919

Leon, Iowa, April 29, 1919. Board met in special session at call of the auditor, (notice having been served on each member as required by law) for the purpose of receiving, opening, and considering bids on bridge and culvert work as advertised in the official papers, April 17, 1919, and accepting such bid or bids and closing contracts on same as might be deemed advisable.

The following members were present: P. C. Morgan, W. H. Colter, and E. J. Blair. There was present also County engineer Otto Sjolander and District Engineer L. H. Martin, and various bidders.

Chairman P. C. Morgan called the meeting to order and the following bids were received, opened and read: A. Phelps & Son, Knoxville, Iowa, \$24,600.00 Des Moines, Iowa, 25,000.00 Pickens Engine & Construction Co., Sloux City, Iowa, 22,240.00 Koss Construction Co., Des Moines, Iowa, 22,696.00

Each with additional charge for concrete bottom footings and extra piling. After careful consideration, it was moved by E. J. Blair and seconded by W. H. Colter that the lump sum bid of \$22,696.00 by the Koss Construction Co. be accepted. Upon ballot the motion carried. A contract was then drawn up in accordance with the above resolution and signed by the Koss Construction Co., and the Board of Supervisors and forwarded to the State Highway Commission for their approval.

The jack named Missouri Bill, owned by Ed Flora, Davis City, Decatur County, Iowa, described as follows: Color brown; markings, neatly nose; foaled in the year 1910, is not of pure breeding, and is, therefore, not eligible to registry in any Stud Book recognized by the Iowa Department of Agriculture, but was examined by Dr. F. G. Hume, veterinarian, on April 29, 1918, and at that time certified as being free from all the diseases and unsoundnesses enumerated in the Stallion Law.
