George Morgan.

George Morgan was born near Dresden, in Muskingum county, Ohio, May 4th, 1835; died at the home of his son, E. C. Morgan, at New Hampton, Mo., aged 84 years, 7 months and 6 days. He was united in marriage to Frances E. Frazier, Oct. 30, 1860. Came to Missouri in 1865. To this union ten children were born, four dying in infancy. The six surviving children are Charles, of Omaha, Neb.; George of Akron, Mo.; William, Mercer, North Dakota; Ernest, of New Hampton, Mo.; Robert F. of Des Moines, Iowa, and Mary, wife of Henry Evans, of Blytheville, Mo. All were present during his last illness, except William, who was unable to be there. Also two brothers and two sisters, Washington Morgan of Bethany, Mo.; Harvey Morgan of Leon, Iowa; Jennima Poland, of Bethany, Mo.; and Lou Ewing of Westerville, Iowa. His wife preceded him to that better world October 20, 1915.

His remains were taken to the Akron Presbyterian church, the church he helped to erect, organize and sustain until the end of a period of nearly half a century, he and his wife being the first Presbyterian family in Harrison county. A large concourse of friends were present to pay their last tribute of respect to one they knew and loved so well. Rev. L. Layman, of Grant City, Mo. delivered. We cannot call it a funeral sermon, but an eulogy on his life and character, after the usual open grave in the Akron cemetery received all that was mortal of one who has left behind him a monument more enduring than bronze or granite to his immediate family, friends and all with whom he came in contact.

On October 20th, 1919, at the home of their daughter, Mary, their golden wedding was celebrated, surrounded by their children and lifelong friends. At the organization of the Presbyterian church at Akron in 1847, he was chosen an elder, and held that position at the time of his death. Many will remember him as a successful teacher in our public schools. For many years he was a correspondent from Akron to various county papers. Some eight years ago he left the farm and with his wife made their home among their children where every care was lavished upon them. His last illness was of short duration.

Companionable, charitable to a marked degree, his life has made the world brighter and better.

Mrs. Philena Jane Youngs.

Mrs. Philena Jane Youngs was born in Sandusky County, Ohio, Sept. 27, 1842. At the age of 17 she moved to the farm of her father, Jacob Sheffler, and Lucinda Brakefield Shaffer, in a prairie schooner, to Rockville township, Kankakee county, Ill. She died at the home of her son, Bert Youngs at Pleasanton, Iowa, Jan. 9th, 1920, at the age of 77 years, 3 months and 12 days.

On Jan. 1, 1861, she was united in marriage with Leonard G. Youngs, who passed away at Quincy, Ill., Aug. 28th 1865. To this union were born three children, Anna Youngs Sicker, who died April 6, 1912; Ruby Youngs Armstrong who passed away Oct. 14th, 1904; Bert Youngs. Three brothers, James P. Sheffler who resides near Pleasanton, Iowa; Geo. Sheffler of Portland, Oregon; and Charles Sheffler of Montesano, Ill. Woodstock, Ill.; Mrs. J. H. Cummings, of Chicago, Ill., and Mrs. H. R. Schnee, of Long Beach, Cal; seven grandchildren and two great grandchildren survives her.

Two brothers, Frank and one granddaughter and one grandson had preceded her in death.

After her husband's death she lived in Illinois, Arkansas and Iowa, having lived here about 8 years.

She became united with the Methodist church early in life and was a firm believer in that faith to the last.

The funeral was held at home Sunday afternoon, conducted by Rev. Thompson, of Hamilton, Iowa, which was largely attended and interment was made in the Hamilton cemetery.

Mrs. Frank Zika.

Susanna Goodman was born near Hagerstown, Indiana, August 5, 1850, and with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Samuel Goodman, moved to Decatur county, Iowa, when she was only four years old, where she grew to womanhood.

She was married to Frank Zika, May 5, 1871. After residing about

eleven years in Iowa, she with her husband moved to Dakota, where they lived seven years, returning to Iowa in 1890, where they had since resided, having lived on the present home place in Clarke county since the spring of 1895.

Mrs. Zika came to visit her daughter, Mrs. F. M. Davis, near Crown, where she became ill, and passed away January 16, 1920, aged 69 years, 5 months and 11 days.

To this union were born four children, Mrs. Anna F. Davis, Weldon, Iowa, Mrs. Mary Smith, Osceola, Iowa, George A. Zika, Ottumwa, Iowa, Edward A. Zika, Weldon, Iowa, all of whom with their aged father and ten grandchildren, as well as a host of other relatives and friends remain to mourn her departure.

About four weeks ago she made a public confession of her Savior and expressed a desire to unite with His church.

Thus passes from our midst another old settler, who was a true friend, and an honorable citizen.

Funeral services were held in the church at Leslie, conducted by J. F. Garber, her remains being interred in the Green Bay cemetery near her old home.

Mrs. Jasper Record.

Henrietta J. Mills was born in Leon, Iowa, October 28, 1870, died at her home in Leon on January 17, 1920, aged 49 years, 4 months and 19 days.

She was the second daughter of Henry and Lovisa Mills, who have both preceded her. She was married to Jasper Record on March 14, 1917. She leaves to mourn her loss a loving husband, step-daughter, six brothers and three sisters, a number of relatives and a host of friends.

She was united with the Church of Christ of Eden Prairie about five years ago and proved a faithful member of the church until her summons home.

Funeral services were held at the Christian church in Leon Monday, Jan. 19th, at 2 o'clock, conducted by Wm. J. Campbell, of Davis City, interment being in the Leon cemetery. The floral offerings were many and beautiful.
