SOLDIER IS ASKED TO BURY HIMSELF.

Can't Make Uncle Sam Understand He is Alive—Body is Coming From France.

St. Louis, Mo.—Herman H. Phillips of Berdan, Ills., formerly of Company E, 166th Infantry, Rainbow Division, is in the position of awaiting the arrival of his own body. The body is coming in a government casket from the cemetery at Chateau-Thierry, and Phillips is wondering what he will do with it when it arrives. He is at present on the payroll of the Chicago & Alton railroad at Berdan, and he doesn't want the railroad company to learn that he is "dead."

Phillips recently made a trip to convince the officials he is not dead. Phillips' father, J. F. Phillips, received official notice two weeks ago that the body of his son was being sent to him and to be prepared to receive it. Later he received a telegram giving further notice of the shipment of the body. The war department repeatedly that Herman is alive, but the records show he is dead, and the department not only stands on its records, but is determined to deliver the body

Herman Phillips carries numerous scars that might have been the reason for giving him a military funeral, but he survived them. At Chateau-Thierry on July 28, 1918, both his legs were broken and he received a bayonet wound along one forearm and a dagger thrust through the wrist. The scar of another wound is on the top of his head.

The Cost of Wool in a Suit.

The cost of raw wool makes little difference to the cost of a suit. The New York State College of Agriculture, in a recent statement, points out that a man's suit contains about three yards and a quarter of cloth, or eight pounds of wool, costing, say \$5. If shoddy is used instead of wool, from 75c to \$3 may be saved on the first cost; but there is no real saving to the customer, as the suit wears out so much faster.

"Shoddy" is the technical term for wool that has been re-worked. If it is made from woolen rags, or clothing that has seen much hard service, it probably has not much wearing value if made into clothing.

On the other hand, shoddy made from high class tailors' clippings may give better service than if made from some of the low grade virgin wools.

What a County School Nurse Finds.

Now that Decatur county is to have a county school nurse which will be provided for the coming year by the Leon and Lamoni Red Cross Chapters, people will be interested in the following report of what the county nurse in Ringgold county did during the month of May as shown by the following report:

School children examined.....	356
Defective vision.....	130
Defective hearing.....	73
Nasal obstruction.....	47
Enlarged tonsils.....	77
Defective teeth.....	191
Children over 10 pounds under-weight.....	51

In four parts of the county five patients have received actual bed side care. This is entirely free of charge. When you subscribed to the Red Cross a year or two ago you paid for the services of Miss Stallard, who is glad to give her services to anyone at any time. The work it took to produce the Clinic held the first of June was not in vain.

The child specialist, Dr. Watts of Creston examined 56 children, twelve of which may be benefited by the Perkin's law, which provides hospital care and treatment by the state to all those who really do not have the means to have a long course of

treatment otherwise. The Haskell Klans Law provides for adults in the same way.

Forty-four of the 56 children were found to be held in ill health by tonsils, adenoids and defective teeth. Dr. A. Fred Watts recommends every tooth being cared for, temporary fillings for temporary teeth, but clean them up.

Dr. Peck, T. B. specialist of Des Moines diagnosed four cases out of fifteen suspects as actually having T. B. The others are warned and by proper living will escape the disease. These cases are invited to confer with Miss Stallard in regard to proper living.
