By producing 87,914,633 pounds of butter, valued at \$42,969,285, Iowa in 1919, moved into second place as a butter-producing state. For Iowa this is a decided increase of more than 2,000,000 pounds over the production of 1918 when 84,888,394 pounds were marketed. Dairy products and dairy cows are much in demand in Iowa and the business is booming, according to M. Mortenson, head of the dairy department at Iowa State College. "Never before have dairy cows been so much demanded," says Mr. Mortenson, "as they are at present. With the increase in the value of the cow the farmer is not content merely to raise corn but wants something where he can get ready money."


