## SLANDER ALLEGED IN SUIT ON FILE

John A. Slusher Alleges That Sam Bernstein Made Statement Accusing Him of Being Guilty of Larceny.

### ACTION AGAINST CITY

John G. Lisle Claims That He Slipped on Crossing in West Keokuk and That He is Permanently Injured.

Suit for alleged slander was filed today in the district court by John A. Slusher vs. Sam Bernstein. Plaintiff is asking judgment for \$2,000 on the alleged slanderous statement which it is claimed defendant made in the presence of several persons. Plaintiff alleges in his petition that in August of last year, that defendant with wicked and malicious intent to injure plaintiff in a certain discourse "did speak and publish substantially the false words: 'You (meaning this plaintiff) are a thief. You stole my property. That suit case is mine. You give it to me' or words to that effect."

It is alleged that defendant intended to accuse plaintiff of larceny, and did so accuse him in the alleged statements, for which judgment of \$2,000 is demanded.

#### Damage Suit Against City.

Claiming that he slipped on a crossing which was covered with snow and ice, and received injuries which are permanent, John G. Lisle has filed suit for damages against the city of Keokuk asking for judgment for \$1,500. Lisle, according to his petition slipped on the crossing at B and Bluff streets last February. The crossing was coated with snow and ice, he alleges, and notice of its dangerous condition had been given the city.

Lisle also alleges that he has complied with the law and given notice to the city. His injury he alleges is to his left knee and leg, and that it has become permanent.

Judgment for \$260.50 is asked for in a suit filed today in the district court by L. Sterne & Co., vs. Sam Bernstein. Judgment is alleged to be due on a promissory note.



**Drowned Before Daughter's Eyes.** ROCK ISLAND, Ill., April 5.—Hill Cox, 66, civil war veteran, was drowned in Rock river here when a skiff, in which he was riding, went over a dam, upsetting the craft. The man's daughter saw him perish, helpless to extend him aid.

**Engineer's Clean Record.** ROCK ISLAND, Ill., April 5.—Engineer James H. Sheehan, retired, has been put on a pension by the Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific railroad after a half century of continuous service for that company. He has the unusual record of having not injured a passenger or employee, or never having himself received a scratch in an accident.

**Farmer Killed in Fight.** BLOOMINGTON, Ill., April 5.—A. C. Meikel, aged 55, a wealthy farmer, was killed Monday in a fight with Floyd Craig, in the village of Downs. Meikel was knocked down and his head struck the concrete street, killing him instantly.

**Slow Wife and Self.** OTTAWA, Ill., April 5.—William Brown of Lostant, LaSalle county, shot his wife Monday and then killed himself, sending a bullet through his temple. Mrs. Brown was taken to a hospital where physicians said she could not live. The shooting came after suit for divorce had been filed by Mrs. Brown. The husband went to his wife's home in LaSalle

and after upbraiding her, started shooting.

**Drainage Congress Called.** QUINCY, Ill., April 5.—At the solicitation of J. H. Nolan, reclamation agent for the state of Missouri, a drainage congress has been called to meet in Quincy April 10. Hundreds of invitations were mailed today to men in the Mississippi Valley between Keokuk, Ia., and Elsbury, Mo. An appeal will be made to congress for support and the use of a portion of the funds which are expected to be provided for in a bill now pending in congress which provides for river improvement above Cape Girardeau, Mo.

**Drown in Reservoir.** KIRKSVILLE, Mo., April 5.—Merle Vice, 11 years old, and A. J. Edwards, 65, both of Kirksville, were drowned here when the little girl fell into the city reservoir, and the old man sprang into the water to rescue her. The child and Hallie Downing, about the same age, were playing on the bank of the reservoir, and the other child was the only eye witness to the accident. Edwards was the engineer at the reservoir pumping station, and although he jumped in promptly, was unable to get the little girl out.

**Hancock County Fair.** CARTHAGE, Ill., April 5.—Subscriptions made to the county fair have swelled it to nearly the 5,000 mark, according to reliable reports. Just as soon as that amount is reached incorporation papers will be taken out and work will be taken up in earnest in order to get the best attractions available.

**Postmaster Job Goes Begging.** NEVADA, Ia., April 5.—There is an interesting contest on at Roland over the postoffice appointment. Roland is a town of 6000 people and without a democrat within the incorporate limits. Neither is there a democrat within the trading territory of the village that will accept the appointment of postmaster, although it pays better than \$1,300 a year.

**Too Young to Marry.** HANNIBAL, Mo., April 5.—After having been refused a marriage license at Palmyra because of their youthful appearance and failure to present the necessary affidavit from the parents, Frank Jefferson and Miss Edith Austin, both of Palmyra, were refused licenses by G. S. Brockenbrough, clerk of the Hannibal court of common pleas, to whom the couple applied.

**Des Moines' Wetness.** DES MOINES, April 5.—Liquor valued at more than \$2,000 now is held in the city jail here awaiting condemnation proceedings. The liquor is piled in the "bell pen" of the jail and includes more than 2,000 pints of

whiskey and dozens of barrels of beer. In a record-breaking raid 1,316 pints of whiskey and 72 bottles of beer were confiscated from freight and express depots.

**Baby Contest at Marshalltown.** MARSHALLTOWN, Ia., April 5.—Marshalltown is holding its first baby contest. Babies between six months and two years have been entered. Twelve doctors will act as judges.

**Peor Outlook For Iowa Fruit.** DES MOINES, Ia., April 5.—The best that fruit of Iowa will do this year is 70 per cent of a full crop, providing ideal conditions prevail during the summer, according to the report issued by Wesley Greene, state horticulturist. The average for April for the past 17 years is 77 per cent, so that the outlook this year is 7 per cent below normal, due to ice which formed on the trees and remained for nearly ten days. This injured the plum, cherry, and peach buds.

**Waterloo Postal Receipts Show Gain.** WATERLOO, Ia., April 5.—The best quarter in the history of the Waterloo postoffice closed March 31. The receipts for the three months amounted to \$57,978. The gain over 1915 was \$15,479, or nearly 25 per cent. March receipts were \$25,570, against \$22,907 in the same month last year.

**Women Ask For Better Garbage Disposal.** FORT MADISON, Ia., April 5.—A petition signed by 200 women, representing six of the most influential women's clubs of the city, has been presented to the members of the city council, asking that the city take more sanitary and precautionary methods of disposing of the garbage in the city.

### SPECIAL ORDINANCE NO. 473.

An ordinance granting the Keokuk & Des Moines Railway company the right and privilege of constructing, maintaining and operating a sidetrack to connect with the present switch in Railroad street between M and O streets and the private sidetrack of the Keokuk Electro Metals company.

Be it ordained by the city council of the city of Keokuk, Iowa: Section 1. That there is hereby granted unto the Keokuk & Des Moines Railway (operated by the Chicago, Rock Island & Pacific Railway company, J. N. Dickerson, receiver), its successors and assigns, the right and privileges of constructing, maintaining, using and operating a sidetrack in Railroad street, between said M and O streets, in Ford's addition to the city of Keokuk, Lee county, Iowa, from its present sidetrack between said M and O streets to the private sidetrack of the Keokuk Electro Metals company.

Section 2. All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict with the provisions hereof are hereby repealed.

Section 3. The said Keokuk & Des Moines Railway company shall pay the cost of publication of this ordinance.
