

MISSING FOR FIVE WEEKS; FIND BODY

Buzzard's Island, Near Gregory, Mo., Gives up Body of Frank W. Hoover of Alexandria, Who Was Drowned.

IDENTIFICATION MADE

Clothing and Boots Worn by Man Who Dropped Out of Sight Over Month Ago, Only Means of Identification.

[Special to The Gate City.] ALEXANDRIA, Mo., May 1.—The body of Frank W. Hoover, who disappeared from this place five weeks ago today was found yesterday on Buzzard's Island near Gregory.

The identification of the body was made through the clothing and boots and sixty-five cents in the pocket of the drowned man's trousers.

Reed Finds Body. Albert Reed found the body. Dr. Rebo, the coroner at Alexandria, was notified and with H. F. Kirchner went to the island below Gregory.

There were marks on Hoover's clothing showing that he had been thrown out of his boat when it turned over. All of these matters served as identification.

WAS FOUND DEAD IN BED YESTERDAY

Andrew F. Lantz, Former Resident, Passed Away Suddenly at Mount Pleasant.

Andrew F. Lantz, a former resident of Keokuk and a brother of C. W. Lantz of this city, was found dead in his bed at the state hospital at Mount Pleasant, yesterday morning.

The body was sent home, arriving here early this morning and the funeral was held from the Swedish Lutheran church, Twelfth and Morgan streets, at 2:30 o'clock this afternoon.

Andrew F. Lantz was born in Sweden in the year 1853, and was 32 years, 8 months and 27 days of age. He came to the United States and to Keokuk in the year 1897 and for several years following was employed at Taber's mill.

He was married in 1908 to Elizabeth Lindberg. His wife died on February 12, four years ago. A daughter, Marie Elizabeth Lantz, seven years old, survives, and is living with an aunt at Summitville, Ia.

NEW PROCEEDINGS HAVE STARTED

Arlow Wilson Declared a Delinquent and Incurable in Papers Filed in Superior Court.

HEARING WAS TODAY

When Judge Bank on Saturday ordered Arlow Wilson, the hero of numerous recent youthful adventures, discharged from the custody of Chief of Police Hennemann, he did not by any means close the case.
