Keokuk Retailers League Will Hold May Meeting in Neighboring City This Week.

MUCH BUSINESS ON HAND

Several Very Important Matters Will be Brought up at Session—Lot Secretary Know Tomorrow.

The Keokuk Retailers' league will hold its regular May meeting on Wednesday night of this week at Nauvoo.

It is expected that this will be a banner meeting, and will successfully inaugurate the summer season of meetings in nearby towns.

Many Bad Beans. OTTUMWA, Iowa, May 15.—Enough canned pork and beans to feed the German army for many days have been seized from wholesale houses in this district by U. S. Marshal N. F. Reed because it does not conform with the pure food act.

The seizure can be attributed to the European war," said Marshal Reed. "The warring nations placed big orders for this product with American canners who gave them the best of the crop, and they then canned the cullings, or second grade, for consumption in this country."

The second grade is so inferior that the government took a hand in the matter and ordered it confiscated.

Already about 30,000 cans of pork and beans has been seized by Reed and his forces are still busy gathering in the defective product.

Corpses as Exhibits. BOULDER, Colo., May 15.—Two nameless dead men, each spoken of simply as the "corpse," have become central figures in the trial of Rienz Dickens, on the charge of murdering his wealthy father. Prosecution and defense have each shot a corpse to learn what happened to the bullet, a vital difference having arisen in the trial over the nature of the bullet which killed W. H. Dickens. The defense claims that a bullet from the high powered rifle owned by the son was not used by the assassin. The state announced today that its test proved the same kind of a bullet caused Dickens' death.

THINK THEY HAVE MAN WANTED HERE

Local Officials Believe Person in Custody in Lemont is One Wanted for Montroy Job, Recently.

DESERTED BRIDE THERE

Illinois Police Book Him Under the Name of Ryan—Riley Was the Name Given Here.

Local officials are of the belief that a man arrested yesterday at Lemont, Ill., who gave the name of J. N. Ryan is the man who is wanted at Montrose for deserting his bride, passing a worthless check and for other charges for which St. Johns, Kan., authorities want him. The Montrose episode happened a month ago, and the man who had the leading part in it gave the name of J. M. Riley.

Sheriff John C. Scott has written to Lemont to find out about the man arrested there yesterday. The Chicago Herald today carried a front page story concerning Ryan, who it was said, electrified the natives of the Illinois town by lighting his cigar with dollar bills.

According to the story, Ryan is wanted by authorities in St. Johns, Kan., and Frankfort, Ind. The former place is the one from which he eloped, and to which his deserted bride was returned by the Lee county authorities. The Frankfort authorities are said to be interested in the automobile, which it is claimed was a mortgaged car.

Ryan or Riley passed a check for \$100 on the Montrose bank, after getting a resident there to identify him. The check was found to be worthless when it came to the collection of it.
