FRENCH STEAMER SUNK.

LONDON, May 18.—The French steamer Mira has been sunk. The Mira displaced 3,650 tons and was 315 feet long, with a 41 foot beam. She was built in 1905 and was registered at Marseilles.

Express Drivers Strike.

CHICAGO, May 18.—Government intervention in the strike of 2,000 express drivers was threatened today by express company officials who announced their intention of applying for a federal writ to restrain strikers from picketing. They claim it is a violation of interstate commerce law as it hampers operations of wagons. Five hundred depot helpers, train messengers and bill clerks joined the walkout today.

LEE SUPERVISORS TAKE NO ACTION

Resolution to Use County Attorney in Prosecuting Assessor's Appeal, is Laid on the Table.

NOTICE TO COUNCILMEN

S. H. Johnston Served Notice of Appeal on Mayor Lofton and Manager Kellogg in Tax Matter.

The Lee county board of supervisors in session yesterday at Fort Madison laid on the table the proposed resolution which was presented to them, asking for the services of the county attorney in prosecuting the appeal of the city assessor, S. H. Johnston, from the action of the city council sitting as a board of review in the matter of taxation of the Mississippi River Power company.

It is intimated, according to advices from Fort Madison, that the assessor may carry the case to the district court. It was thought that it was in this regard that he asked for the services of the county attorney. The full text of the resolution which was presented by the assessor and which the board laid on the table is as follows:

"Be it resolved, that the county attorney be and he is hereby directed to assist and join in the assessment appeal on behalf of S. H. Johnston, assessor, the board of supervisors and any other officers or taxpayers who may desire to appeal from the action of the city council of the city of Keokuk, sitting as a board of review, in relation to the reducing of the assessment of the Mississippi River Power company upon its property. And the county attorney is directed to take such steps and proceedings as may be necessary to effect and prosecute said appeal to a final termination."

Second Appeal Served.

The city council was served this morning with a second notice of appeal from Johnston. This notice is addressed to Ed. S. Lofton, chairman of the board of review, and C. W. Kellogg, manager of the Mississippi River Power company, and in this document the assessor states that he will appeal from the decision of the council in the matter of reducing the tax on the power company.

non-partisan league that Thomas A. Edison, inventor, will take the stump for Colonel Roosevelt during the week preceding the convention, centered Chicago's pre-convention interest directly on the Roosevelt boom.

The non-partisan league announced that President Hibben of Princeton university, who succeeded Woodrow Wilson there also will take the stump for Roosevelt.

Chicago will be on parade after another convention week. The big preparedness parade, scheduled for June 3, will be followed on June 7 by

the suffragette demonstration. The problem of caring for delegates and spectators became more complicated today with the announcement of the date for the preparedness parade. It was believed thousands who would come to Chicago to view this spectacle would remain over for the convention week.

Delegates to the republican convention who bring their wives to Chicago as spectators will have to provide entertainment for them themselves. The bull moose, however, have arranged an elaborate series of pink teas, receptions and dinner parties at Lake Shore Drive residences.

The woman's party convention headquarters sent a rapid fire speaking corps, headed by Miss Mabel Vernon of Wilmington, Del., through the middle west today to draw crowds to the convention.
