PRIMARY BATTLE AT POLLS MONDAY

Contest for Governor on the Republican Ticket, Thorne-Kennedy Fight and Suffrage Ballot Make It Interesting.

SIZE OF VOTE PROBLEM

Suffrage Organizations Are Going to do Personal Work at Polls to Insure Favorable Balloting.

PRIMARY FACTS AT A GLANCE.

Polls open from 7 o'clock a. m. to 8 o'clock p. m., in the cities and from 9 o'clock a. m. to 8 o'clock p. m. in the rural districts.

Voting places in Keokuk will be the following:

First precinct—26 North Fourth street.
Second precinct—328 Main street.
Third precinct—Washington school, 125 North Ninth street.
Fourth precinct—225 B street.
Fifth precinct—314 North Fourteenth street.
Sixth precinct—1024 Main street.
Seventh precinct—Keokuk Electric company's car barn.

The state primary and special election will be held in Keokuk and throughout the state of Iowa on Monday. The election on Monday will have special interest in this part of the county due to the triangular fight for the nomination for governor on the republican ticket, the Kennedy-Thorne contest, and the balloting for the constitutional amendment which will give the vote to the women of the state if it passes.

On the democratic ticket there is a three cornered contest for state representative, waged between C. H. Dickey of Keokuk, John W. Stewart of West Point, and C. M. Storms of Fort Madison. Another fight that is being waged is in the supervisors' list, with G. E. Maxwell of Keokuk, present member of the board, opposing Fred Mayhew, on the democratic ticket, and W. E. Patterson opposing Charles Shafer and A. P. Fletcher opposing L. Hosier, present member of the board.

The democrats have to make a choice in the office of treasurer and in that of county recorder, two candidates being in the field for the former office and three for the latter. William Reimbold, present treasurer, is opposed by the deputy at Fort Madison, T. S. Harrington, Francis Hayes and F. A. Rumbaugh are the three who want to be recorder.

Governor Fight Is Hot.
On the republican state ticket, the Harding-Cosson-Allen fight for governor is attracting the most attention. Harding supporters are expecting to get out a big vote here. There are plenty of candidates for attorney general, too, on the republican side. Charles A. Kennedy is opposed for his nomination for congress by Clifford Thorne. This contest has attracted no little attention and has been a hard fought affair.

The Suffrage Vote.
The vote on the constitutional amendment will be a figure in this primary Monday. The ballot will be printed separately from the other ballot, and should be asked for by every voter. The ballot will be printed on yellow paper.

The women's organization which has been pushing the fight for the ballot will have workers stationed at every polling place, and the men will be reminded again that they should vote "yes." The organization plans to meet all of the voters as they go to the polls and a request for a favorable vote will be made. While the women haven't the right to vote—as yet—they are going to make every possible vote count for them, and are hopeful of carrying the amendment.

Returns Will be Shown.
Election fans will have to be patient as the polls will not close until 8 o'clock Monday evening. This is an hour later than usual, and the counting of ballots will be delayed just that much longer. No definite returns will be at hand before Tuesday morning, and it is doubtful if much will be known then, except from a few scattering precincts.

Another matter which will have a bearing on the count is the size of the election. It is likely that an unusually large number of voters will be out in the cities. The rural votes depend entirely on the condition of work on the farms.

Every voter is entitled to vote at this election who was registered in 1912 or has registered since that time. Some one is distributing the information that men in the rural districts cannot vote until November. There is absolutely nothing to this, as all voters have the right to vote at the primaries, and registration is not necessary outside of cities.

The registration boards are in session today and will be until 9:00 o'clock tonight, to register any who have changed their residence, or who are new voters, or whose names are not on the poll book for any reason.

Notice of intention to grade between sub-grade and established grade, and pave with concrete the following alleys, to-wit: Through Block 3 A, Estes Addition, Block 3, Reeves, Perry & Williams Addition, Blocks 47, 58 and 45, City of Keokuk.

Notice is hereby given that a meeting of the City Council of the City of Keokuk, held on the 29th day of May, 1916, there was introduced the resolution hereinafter set forth, and that by resolution of the City Council, duly passed on the said date, the said resolution hereinafter set forth will be considered by the City Council for passage, at a meeting to be held in the council chamber in said city at 9 o'clock a. m., on the 19th day of June, 1916, at which time the owners of property subject to assessment for the cost of the improvement contemplated by the said resolution, may appear before the said council and make objection to the contemplated improvement and the passage of the said proposed resolution, if any they have, said resolution being as follows:

Resolution of Necessity for Street Improvement.

RESOLUTION NO. 62.
Be It Resolved by the City Council of the City of Keokuk, that it is deemed advisable and necessary to make improvements by grading between sub-grade and established grade, and paving with concrete, the foundation to be prepared, grading done and parcels of land abutting thereon, and adjacent thereto, according to area, so as to include one-half of the privately owned property between the alley improved and the next alley, whether such privately owned property abut upon said alley or not, but in no case shall privately owned property situated more than one hundred fifty (150) feet from the alley so improved be so assessed, to the extent that the same is assessable by law, said assessments to be made in accordance with the law governing the same.

Be It Further Resolved, That the City Council will meet at 9:00 o'clock a. m., on the 19th day of June, 1916, in the council chamber in the City of Keokuk, for the purpose of considering objections to the passage of the said proposed resolution, and to the construction of the said improvement, at which hearing the above resolution may be amended and passed, or passed as proposed.

Be It Further Resolved, That the City Clerk be and he is hereby instructed to cause notice of the pendency of the above resolution and the time at which the said proposed resolution will be considered by this council, and objections to the passage thereof heard, to be published as provided by law in The Daily Gate City, a newspaper of general circulation, published in the City of Keokuk.
