

ROBBERY SUSPECT TAKEN AT WARSAW

John Campbell, Charged With Breaking and Entering Smyth Home, Arrested Last Night.

BROUGHT TO KEOKUK

Warrant for Arrest Issued Some Time Ago, But Campbell Disappeared—Some Goods Recovered.

John Campbell, who has been sought by the local authorities in connection with the robbery of the home of Miss Sallie C. Smyth at 720 Morgan street, the early part of May, was arrested in Warsaw last night by Marshal Bennett. Officer Conn brought him to Keokuk and he is now in jail here waiting to be arraigned on the charge.

Immediately following the robbery, the police secured evidence that led them to file an information against Campbell, charging breaking and entering and securing a warrant for his arrest, but the man they were after got out of town and was not apprehended until last night.

It seems that Campbell had been working on the steamer Keokuk during the past two weeks and evidently Marshall Bennett made the arrest as Campbell stepped off the boat. His wife lives in Warsaw and a close watch had been kept in that town for his appearance there.

The suspicion of the police was directed to Campbell following the finding of the gold watch, which was among the stolen articles, in a local jewelry store. It was sold there, the police say, by Jules Villannes, who when questioned by the police, said that Campbell had given it to him to sell, saying that it belonged to his wife.

Some of the articles of clothing and a pair of shoes, taken from the Smyth home have been recovered. They were found in a house on lower Main street and the residents there told the police that Campbell had left them there, saying that they belonged to his wife but that she had refused to live with him any longer, and he wanted to dispose of the goods.

Campbell will probably not be arraigned until tomorrow. He is a man of about fifty years of age and so far as the records show, has been in no previous trouble with the police.

The Smyth robbery occurred some night in the week previous to May 15. A number of articles of clothing, several pairs of shoes and some jewelry were taken.

CANNING EXPERT WILL COME HERE

State Leader Bishop is Arranging With Chairman Renaud of the Fall Celebration Committee for Demonstration.

SHE WILL BE AT PICNIC

Another Day May be Spent at Donnellson and on Friday, She Will Come to Keokuk.

A canning demonstration under the supervision of an expert from Ames will be held in Keokuk probably June 23. There will be a demonstration at the county picnic at West Point on June 21, and arrangements will be made for one at Donnellson on June 22, according to present plans.

Chairman Renaud of the fall festival committee, received a letter from State Leader E. C. Bishop asking if arrangements could not be made for the demonstration a little later in the month. It is the intention of the state leader to send one of the best canning experts to Lee county. Miss Snyder who was here several weeks ago, gave the move an impetus, and the leader who will come for the special demonstrations this month will be enthusiastically received.

It is probable that the members of the Civic League will be asked to sponsor the demonstration and that Keokuk women as well as the girls who will enter the canning club will be invited to the demonstration.

If the expert can give three days to the work here she will be asked to come to West Point for the picnic and then to Donnellson for Thursday and to Keokuk Friday.
